# **ANTI-BULLYING POLICY**

#### Introduction

This policy is based on DfE guidance 'Preventing and Tackling Bullying. #### 1) Objectives of this Policy

This policy outlines what NGHS will do to prevent and tackle bullying. The policy has been drawn up through the involvement of the whole school community and we are committed to developing an antibullying culture whereby no bullying, including between adults or adults and children and young people will be tolerated. This school is a place where every person has the right to be themselves and to be included in a safe and happy environment. Everyone at our school is equal and should be treated with respect.

# 2) Our school community:

Bullying of any kind is unacceptable and will not be tolerated at our school. The safety, welfare and wellbeing of all our students and staff is a key priority. We take all incidences of bullying seriously and it is our duty as a whole school community to take measure to prevent and tackle any bullying, harassment or discrimination. Our school community does this by:

- Discussing, monitoring and reviewing our anti-bullying policy and practice on a regular basis.
- Supporting all staff to promote positive relationships to prevent bullying and will intervene by identifying and tackling bullying behaviour appropriately and promptly.
- Ensuring that students are aware that all bullying concerns will be dealt with sensitively and effectively; that students feel safe to learn; and that students abide by the anti-bullying policy.
- Reporting back to parents/carers regarding their concerns on bullying and dealing promptly with complaints. Parents/carers in turn work with the school to uphold the anti-bullying policy.
- Seeking to learn from good anti-bullying practice elsewhere and utilising support from the Local Authority and other relevant organisations when appropriate.

#### 3) **Definition of bullying**

Bullying is defined as "the repetitive, intentional harming of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an imbalance of power" (Anti-bullying Alliance).

Bullying is therefore:

- Deliberately hurtful
- Repeated, often over a period of time
- Difficult to defend against

Bullying can include: name calling, taunting, mocking, making offensive comments; kicking; hitting; taking belongings; producing offensive graffiti; gossiping; excluding people from groups and spreading hurtful and untruthful rumours. This includes the same inappropriate and harmful behaviours expressed via digital devices (cyberbullying) such as the sending of inappropriate messages by phone, text, Instant Messenger, through websites and social media sites and apps, and sending offensive or degrading images by mobile phone or via the internet.

#### 4) Forms of bullying covered by this Policy

Bullying can happen to anyone. This policy covers all types of bullying including:

• Bullying related to race, religion or culture.

- Bullying related to SEND (Special Educational Needs or Disability).
- Bullying related to appearance or physical/mental health conditions.
- Bullying related to sexual orientation (homophobic, biphobic bullying).
- Bullying of young carers, children in care or otherwise related to home circumstances.
- Sexist, sexual and transphobic bullying.
- Bullying via technology 'cyberbullying'.

# The nature of bullying can be:

- Emotional: such as being unfriendly, excluding, tormenting
- Physical: such as hitting, physical intimidation, kicking, pushing, any use of violence.
- Attacking property: such as damaging, stealing or hiding someone's possessions.
- Racial: such as racial taunts, graffiti, gestures.
- **Direct or indirect Verbal:** such as name calling, spreading rumours about someone, using derogatory or offensive language or threatening someone.
- **Psychological:** such as deliberately excluding or ignoring people.
- **Sexual:** such as explicit sexual remarks, display of sexual material, sexual gestures, unwanted physical attention, comments about sexual reputation or performance, or inappropriate touching.
- Cyber: such as using text, email or other social media to write or say hurtful things about someone.

# No form of bullying will be tolerated and all instances will be taken seriously.

# 5) Reporting Incidents of Bullying

Students who are being bullied: if a student is being bullied they are encouraged to not retaliate but to tell someone they trust about it such as a friend, family member or trusted adult. They are also encouraged to report any bullying incidents in school:

- o **Report to a teacher:** such as form tutor, Head of Year or any other teacher.
- o **Report to a peer mentor:** during the Sixth Form Health and Wellbeing drop in sessions.
- o Report to other schools staff: such as school counsellor or school nurse
- o Call ChildLine to speak to someone in confidence on 0800 1111

#### Reporting – Roles and Responsibilities

**STAFF:** All school staff have a duty to report bullying, to be vigilant to the signs of bullying and to play an active role in the school's efforts to prevent bullying. If staff are aware of bullying, they should reassure the students involved and inform the Head of Year who will liaise with the DSL.

**SLT:** The Senior Leadership Team and the Headteacher have overall responsibility for ensuring that the anti-bullying policy is followed by all members of staff and that the school upholds its duty to promote the safety and wellbeing of all young people. In addition Miss H Clarke is the senior leader responsible for anti-bullying.

**PARENTS AND CARERS:** Parents and carers should look out for potential signs of bullying such as distress lack of concentration, feigning illness or other unusual behaviour. Parents and carers should tell their child not to retaliate and support and encourage them to report the bullying. Parents and carers can report an incident of bullying to the school either in person, or by phoning or emailing the school office and talking to the Form tutor / Head of Year.

**STUDENTS:** Students should not take part in any kind of bullying and should watch out for potential signs of bullying among their peers. They should never be bystanders to incidents of bullying. If students

witness bullying they should support the victim, encourage them to report the bullying and, if possible, accompany them to tell a trusted adult.

#### 6) Responding to bullying

When bullying has been reported, the following actions will be taken:

- Staff will record the bullying on our school system.
- Pastoral teams will monitor the bullying log and inform the Headteacher and governors of the type of incidents on a regular basis
- Support will be offered to those who are the target of bullying from the pastoral team in school
- Staff will pro-actively respond to the bully, who may require support from the pastoral team but they will also be sanctioned for their actions in line with our Behaviour Policy.
- Pastoral staff will inform parents and carers as necessary.
- Staff will assess whether any other authorities need to be involved, particularly where actions also take place outside of school.

# 7) Bullying outside of school

Bullying is unacceptable and will not be tolerated, whether it takes place inside or outside of school. Bullying can take place on the way to and from school, before or after school hours, at the weekends or during the holidays, or in the wider community. The nature of cyber bullying in particular means that it can impact on students' wellbeing beyond the school day. Staff, parents and carers, and students must be vigilant to bullying outside of school and report and respond according to their responsibilities as outlined in this policy.

# 8) **Derogatory Language**

Derogatory or offensive language is not accepted and will not be tolerated. This type of language can take any of the forms of bullying listed in our forms of bullying. It will be challenged by staff and recorded and monitored on SIMS / CPOMS and follow up actions and sanctions, if appropriate, will be taken for students and staff found using any such language. Staff are also encouraged to record the casual use of derogatory language on CPOMS.

#### 9) **Prejudice-based incidents**

A prejudice-based incident is a one-off incident of unkind or hurtful behaviour that is motivated by a prejudice or negative attitudes, beliefs or views towards a protected characteristic or minority group. It can be targeted towards an individual or group of people and have a significant impact on those targeted. All prejudice-based incidents are taken seriously and recorded and monitored in school.

#### 10) School initiatives to prevent and tackle bullying

We use a range of measures to prevent and tackle bullying, including:

- A student-friendly anti-bullying policy to ensure all students understand and uphold the anti-bullying policy
- The PSHE programme of study includes opportunities for students to understand about different types of bullying and what they can do to respond and prevent bullying.
- Form time provides regular opportunities to discuss issues that may arise in class and for form tutors to target specific intervention.
- Whole-school and year group assemblies help raise students' awareness of bullying and use of derogatory language.

- Difference and diversity are celebrated across the school through promotion of awareness days, such as anti-bullying week, Black History Month and LGBT History Month, with events being led by the Health and Wellbeing student group.
- The school ethos and values of equality and respect are embedded across the curriculum to ensure that it is as inclusive as possible.
- Stereotypes are challenged by staff and students across the school.
- Peer-mentoring and the work of the Health and Wellbeing group offer support to all.
- Close work with our police liaison officer to provide support to targets of bullying and those who show bullying behaviours.
- Students are continually involved in developing school wide anti-bullying initiatives through consultation with the Health and Wellbeing group and school council.
- Create and support an inclusive environment which promotes a culture of mutual respect, consideration and care for others which will be upheld by all.
- Actively creating 'safe spaces' for vulnerable children and young people.

#### 13) Monitoring & review, policy into practice

This policy will be monitored and reviewed annually.

The named Governor for bullying will report on a regular basis to the governing body on incidents of bullying and outcomes. The school will ensure that they regularly monitor and evaluate mechanisms to ensure that the policy is being consistently applied. Any issues identified will be incorporated into the school's action planning.
