

Last Friday, forty Year 12 biologists headed to Malham Tarn Field Centre in the Yorkshire Dales for the annual biology field trip. Malham Tarn is a glacial lake, and one of only eight upland alkaline lakes in Europe, making it the perfect place to study ecology. Malham Cove was also used as a location in the sixth Harry Potter film!

After navigating some very windy roads, we arrived at the centre and were handed waterproofs that can only be described as 'fisherman-chic.' Our instructor Alex taught us about methods used to survey plants before we headed out onto the scree slope to collect some data of our own. Upon returning to the centre, we were taught how to carry out statistical analysis on our data, something that will prove incredibly useful in our exams.

On Saturday morning, we walked down to the river, so we could collect some invertebrates, in order to explore energy transfer within an ecosystem. In the afternoon, we aimed to investigate the impact of grazing on the grassland areas around Malham Tarn. In reality, we spent most of the time trying to escape the huge swarm of flies that took an interest in our group!

On Sunday, we visited the small mammal traps that we had left out the night before, to see if we had caught any







mice or voles. Whilst my group were unsuccessful, the other group caught Matilda the mouse and Vixen the vole, who decided to chew its way out of the bag and made a swift break for the trees. We spent the rest of the morning carrying out our own individual investigations into the impact of an abiotic factor on a named species. After collecting our data, we bid farewell to the centre's staff and headed home.

This weekend has been a fantastic opportunity to learn biological skills that would be impossible to develop in the classroom. Malham Tarn is a great location, with excellent views of the lake and the Dales. A big thank you must go to Mrs Dainty, Mrs Han and Mr Tolley for organising the course and making it such a useful trip.
