

The Telford and Wrekin heat of the Rotary Club's 'Youth Speaks' competition was contested by seven teams representing Haberdashers' Abraham Darby, Haberdashers' Adams, NGHS and Telford College. This year, we entered two teams into the competition.

Rachel, Aisha and Caitlin were inspired by the recent work of the Year 12 historians on the topic of genocide and their presentation focused on its origins and how genocide should be taught in schools. The presentation demonstrated sharp insight into the topic and highlighted the important role schools play in ensuring that we never forget the horrors and atrocities of the past. Leoni, Phoebe and Eve then delivered a passionate and thought-provoking presentation entitled 'How Loud is Your Voice in Society?' Within their presentation, they covered a diverse range of topics, exploring why some children will listen to their grandparents more than their parents, as well as the legacy of the suffragette movement.

Both teams represented the school in a mature and articulate manner. Chair of the Judges, Jean Escott, congratulated all the competitors on their performance and on their interesting and well-researched topics before giving the result of the competition to the teams and audience. Leoni, Phoebe and Eve's team were placed second and, along with the winning team from Adams, have been invited to compete in the district final in March.

The Great War Debate

On Friday 9 February, Miss Davies, Mrs Herring and 15 Year 11 GCSE History students travelled to the John Henry Newman College in Chelmsley Wood to take part in the Great War debate. This unique opportunity was organised to mark the centenary of the end of World War One in 1918.

The event was opened by military historian, Dan Hill, who talked about life in the trenches during WWI. This was followed by a panel discussion chaired by BBC journalist, John Young, in which controversial questions really put the experts on the spot!

I think that the Great War Debate was a brilliant experience as it helped me to see how much WWI is still affecting our society today. The amount of information that was condensed into two hours was incredible, from the interesting but fun facts (e.g. 'chatting' comes from the trenches, when soldiers would talk while decontaminating themselves of 'chats', or lice), to the more abstract, such as whether the poppy is still an appropriate act of remembrance, or a compulsory show of remembering a small group of people that doesn't really include the 'hidden heroes'. The audience debated with the panel of experts on the remembrance of animals involved in the war; on the role of the navy; the use of soldiers from the British Empire; and, how patriotism should or should not relate to war. I learnt a lot about WWI and how it affects us today, and I will certainly see Remembrance Day in a different light from now on.





A final note: we were urged by one panellist that the next time we pass our local war memorial, to stop for a moment and consider what it means to us and how we remember those who have fallen for their country.
