

A Level English Literature Information for Students and Summer Work



The Edexcel specification offers exciting possibilities in terms of both breadth and depth. However, students are expected to read extensively and it is essential that you get started on the wider reading over the long summer holiday.

A-Level Units

<u>Exam</u>

1. Drama (30%) – A Streetcar Named Desire by Tennessee Williams + Othello by William Shakespeare (separate essays) – 2 Hours and 15 Minutes

2. Prose (20%) – The Picture of Dorian Gray by Oscar Wilde + Dracula by Bram Stoker (comparative essay) – 1 Hour

3. Poetry (30%) – 1. Comparative question on Forward poetry and unseen poetry + 2. *The Less Deceived* by Phillip Larkin – 2 hours 15 Minutes

4. Coursework (20%)

Coursework (Theme: 20th Century America) (20% - 2 texts)

One comparative essay on the poetry of Robert Frost and *The Great Gatsby* by F.Scott Fitzgerald (2,500 – 3,000 words)

Compulsory Work

1. Read A Streetcar Named Desire by Tennessee Williams.

- 2. Read *The Picture of Dorian Gray* by Oscar Wilde.
- 3. Read *Dracula* by Bram Stoker.

4. Read the 20 named poems from the anthology (the list can be found on the Edexcel website: https://qualifications.pearson.com/content/dam/pdf/A%20Level/English%20Literature/2015/Specification%20and%20sample%20assessments/A-level-Literature-spec-Issue-4.pdf)

5. Explore how the experience of going blind is presented in 'On Her Blindness' by Adam

Thorpe (pages 170-171). (Please word process this if you can. This mini essay will be marked and used to give us an idea of your poetry skills)

There will be reading quizzes on all of the texts listed above at the start of term and we will be taking in the marks!

Sideways Reading for Examination texts

Those of you that would like to do some extra sideways reading may wish to read the following texts. They are all texts that link to the set examination texts:

- **Poetry:** Any of the poems in the anthology.
- **Prose:** Robert Louis Stevenson, *The Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde*; any gothic novels from the 18th or 19th century e.g. *Frankenstein* by Mary Shelley.
- Drama: Tennessee Williams, 'The Glass Menagerie' or any of his other plays.
