Former Student Offers Top Advice to NGHS Pre-Medics

On Monday 10 December, a third year medical student at Cambridge, **Pippa Morris** who previously went to Newport Girls' High School returned to give us a little insight about how to kickstart our journey to do medicine at university and also gave us some helpful advice about Oxbridge applications in general for other subjects as well.

Pippa started off by explaining her indecision when she was in our shoes in Yr12 which reassured me greatly and reminded us to re-evaluate our choices to ensure that medicine was a career we really wanted to pursue as it

is a demanding yet promising career path. She talked about the gruelling application process she went through and emphasized the importance of keeping up with extra-curricular activities and work experience in and out of school and remembering that we shouldn't just be focused on school but take time out to enjoy other activities as well as other things definitely matter. She described in detail the ins and outs and the ups and downs of the current medical course she is taking and it was an enlightening and fascinating talk that answered a lot of my questions by putting many of the rumours about medical school and Oxbridge floating around to rest and she also made me also consider other factors that tie into being a successful applicant that I hadn't thought about before. All in all it was a truly interesting talk and her sharing all her experiences, views, opinions and top tips with us gave me some useful advice for next year and I am very grateful.

Last Tuesday we were extremely interested by a presentation given by David Patrick, who visited our Yr II DT class to talk about the Arkwright Scholarship. This scholarship focuses on inspiring the next generation of engineers, who are in ever increasing demand, across a range of specialities from bio-medical to aerospace to environmental. It is awarded to successful applicants following testing and interviewing, giving amazing help and guidance to those wishing to pursue a career in engineering. The most important benefit is the mentor you receive from the sponsor company (including the likes of Rolls Royce) to guide you on future career options and choices in engineering.

The scholarship also awards the student £600 and gives them the chance to attend many enrichment and VIP events at Universities and trade associations, where they can meet other Arkwright scholars and learn about engineering in greater depth. The presentation showed that the scholarship can make your CV stand out but moreover provide an unrivalled opportunity to explore engineering and even gain you an unconditional offer at University.

Jessica captains India Football Tour

One of our Year 12 students plays for West Bromwich Albion Women's Football Club and she was asked to captain their WINNING tour of India in November. Here are the highlights of her time abroad.

On 10th November I travelled to the Punjab in India along with 7 other teammates and our coach from West Bromwich Albion Women's Football Club, ready to endure a week of activities hosted by the Rurka Kalan FC. As a team we participated in the annual Girls Play Girls Lead Festival which included leadership activities led by the Kick Fair organisation from all parts of the world and a tournament completed within our team.

After a 9 hour flight, we arrived at Amritsar airport tired but excited for the week ahead. We were greeted by many young children who were fascinated to see girls that play for West Brom. and wanted lots of pictures with us. The first day included a parade around the less developed village close to the football club, which was eye opening for many of the girls from West Brom and Canada who had not experienced this way of life before.

Additionally we were split into smaller teams mixed with younger and older girls from all over India and Canada. This allowed me to communicate with the Indian girls and learn the different cultures of India despite the language barrier. In these groups, throughout the week we played a small tournament called Football Three which promoted fair play and enjoyment, furthermore we completed activities in these specific groups which highlighted the hardships that India faces, including gender equality, which is a significant aspect when girls want to play football.



The trip overall managed to break down the barriers through the power of football and the experience was both astonishing and overwhelming. Along with 15 other teams, I also participated in a competitive tournament in India with West Brom, which I was extremely proud to captain and motivate. We won all our games and made it to the final on the last full day of the trip. With a hard battle against a Canadian team, we still prospered and were able to win the whole tournament. Consequently, on the final night at the closing ceremony party, we were presented with a significantly large trophy and medals for each of us to take back to England to remind us of our achievements.

With an early start on the morning of departure to be able to visit the Golden Temple, we said our goodbyes to our new companions the night before. Facing another 9 hour flight back to Birmingham on the 18th November, there were lots of tears from the girls and I, after having an extraordinary experience meeting new people in such an unbelievable country. The opportunity was a once in a lifetime trip but one I will appreciate and never forget.



Speaking Up in Parliament!



Last Wednesday four Y8 and 9 students travelled to London with Mrs Seys to commemorate genocide awareness day and the seventieth anniversary of the genocide convention. The students gave several presentations throughout the day to prominent human rights campaigners, genocide survivors and MPs and peers including Baroness Cox, Baroness D'Souza and Angela Raynor, Shadow Education Secretary. The purpose of their visit was to launch a newspaper that our Genocide and Human Rights Awareness group have been working on in collaboration with students at Hampton School, Pimlico Academy and the Abraham Moss Community College. The newspaper aims to educate young people about twentieth century genocides from a human perspective, and focuses on many individual stories of those whose lives have been touched by genocide. However, my favourite part of this trip was speaking in the Houses of Parliament. It felt like such an honour to be there whilst the European Union Withdrawal Deal is being drafted. This was my favourite aspect because we had already performed our speeches twice and I definitely felt the most confident that time. It was a surreal experience and I'm so thankful to have had it.
