was pleased to read this week that Dr Donna Strickland has been awarded the Nobel Prize in Physics, but shocked to learn that she is only the **third female winner of this award in its history.** Never has it been a more

important time to encourage more girls into STEM-related subjects and I am pleased that my colleagues are not only raising the profile of these subjects in our curriculum, but also supporting girls to attain high results in STEM GCSEs. Female role models in careers less 'traditionally' occupied by women are also inspiring to our students and I would welcome contact from parents who might like to address students about their work.

Last weekend saw our annual Liverpool **Social Weekend** for Year 12 students and I had the pleasure of heading over to Liverpool to visit the group on Sunday morning. The students were certainly roused from any tiredness by 'Ferry 'Cross The Mersey' being blasted out of the loudspeakers on our ferry crossing to Birkenhead! It was clear to see how much fun the girls were having and I would like to thank the seven staff (led by Mrs Bailey and Mrs Griffin) who gave up their whole weekend to ensure that the trip was a success. Tuesday evening saw over fifty girls staying in school to support the **PTA Film Night.** It was lovely to see so many students enjoying the 'Greatest' Film. The sing-along aspect proved popular and I hope that there will be even greater numbers now in our Choir!

As part of the UK Youth Parliament scene, our students have recently voted in the **Make Your Mark Ballot** and have highlighted issues most faced by young people. After being at the school for about a week I was already amazed at the amount of clubs and events that students are encouraged to take part in and how valued the opinions of the students are.



On Friday 21 September the whole school took part in the **Make Your Mark Ballot**. This is a ballot that is organised by members of the Youth Parliament who were wanting to find out the top 5 issues that young people are facing.

- ☑ Votes at 16 = 7%
- ☑ Transport = 3%

# **BEACON SCHOOL QUALITY MARK**

We are thrilled to announce that we have been recognised as the UK's tenth Quality Mark Beacon School by UCL's Centre For Holocaust Education. The Quality Mark award recognises excellence in learning and teaching about the Holocaust, and follows a rigorous inspection process which involved lesson observations, interviews with staff and students and a scrutiny of pupils' work as well as other data gathering. The detailed report, which can be read in full <a href="HERE">HERE</a> notes a number of key strengths of learning and teaching about the Holocaust and human rights throughout the school. The report also recognises the strengths of our students, describing Newport girls as 'articulate, thoughtful citizens; keen to learn, respectful and are the school's best advocates' and praising their literacy levels. The Centre's Nicola Wetherall MBE remarked:

The quality of Holocaust education at Newport Girls High School is excellent and forward looking. The girls are fortunate to have such passionate and engaged teachers whose concern for age-appropriate, research informed, innovative teaching and learning about the Holocaust, results in rich and varied academic and personal development outcomes. Student voice offered informed, empathetic and reflective insights as to provision and practice at the school — their articulate and perceptive remarks revealed the impact of Mrs Seys, Miss Davies and Mr Scott's efforts. Newport girls have experienced a quality provision for and experience of Holocaust education that is unlike many of their national peers and the school community should be hugely proud of all that has been achieved to date in collaboration with the UCL Centre.'



The achievement of the Quality Mark is an exciting recognition of all of the staff and students' hard work in this area and Mrs Seys would like to extend her personal thanks to all the students who were involved in the Quality Mark Review process.

We are now building on our work through a newspaper project with the Hampton School, which a group of students will be presenting in parliament later this year as well as a legacy project regarding the 1995 Bosnian genocide which a group of six students from years 9-11 were given the opportunity to be involved in. # ATTENDANCE MATTERS
