Students have been given strict rules concerning the entries for Bake Off. No fresh cream nor nuts are permitted in any of the bakes. A list of ingredients also has to be given for each bake entered. All entries need to be brought into school to Room 21 on Thursday 27 September ready to be judged at lunchtime. There are four categories in our first ever competition:

- I. **Baking on a budget** a savoury or sweet item which can serve at least eight people for a maximum spend of £3.00.
- 2. **Perfect Pastries** using shortcrust pastry, sweetcrust pastry, flaky pastry, puff pastry, choux pastry, filo pastry or hot water crust pastry. Again this must feed 8+ people
- 3. **European Themed Crazy Cupcakes** twelve identical cupcakes. This competition co-incides

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


5:45am. The school car park. We were all huddled in groups excitedly chatting about the journey ahead.

Four hours later we arrived at Canary Wharf with I Canada Square towering above us, where we began surveying a variety of people, to find more about the area and gather data regarding the 1985 urban regeneration project of the East India Docklands. By II:30 we swiftly made our way to Westfield shopping Centre, where we spent an hour either looking around the vast amount of

shops or eating at Nando's!

Our next destination was the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, where we carried out more surveys and an Environmental Quality Index (rating the cleanliness, accessibility and the Atmosphere). At this point we were all apprehensively discussing the ride down the ArcelorMittal Orbit Slide. Even though the slide was 173 metres long the ride lasted just 34 seconds, as you reach speeds of up to 20mph. Finally we visited the nature reserve and East Village, where the Olympic athletes once stayed. It was clear from this area that urban regeneration in this area was incredibly successful, with beautiful open spaces for the public to enjoy, for example a communal barbeque space. However, just streets away some of the most deprived areas of London were only minutes away.

German Work Experience

Three Sixth Formers enjoyed a week's work experience in Dortmund in July. Here's what happened....

After a very early start on Saturday morning, we arrived at Stanstead airport to meet our group leaders and the other participants in the trip from all over the country. The flight was surprisingly short and we soon arrived in Dortmund, and checked into our youth hostel rooms.

That evening we acclimatised ourselves and explored the city, whilst getting to know everybody. Sunday started off with a guided tour around Dortmund and then in the afternoon, we were free to find our work placements to introduce ourselves, with some being much easier to find than others!

Our first few days working in both the hotel and summer camp were challenging at first with the obvious difficulties in understanding our colleagues and their accents, but we soon found ourselves tuning in to the language. By mid-week,

we were already noticing an improvement in our speaking and listening skills, which we put into practise in the evenings after work, whether it be shopping or eating out in the city.

Throughout the week we had the option to take part in several group activities, with the best being a trip by U-Bahn to the stunning Phoenix See south of the city as well as a guided tour around the Borussia Dortmund football stadium.

By the end of the week, our confidence and practical skills had improved so much that we already knew the week had been worthwhile. Since coming back to school, we have really seen the benefits of taking part with speaking and listening becoming much easier and intuitive.
