I perform regularly in various groups including Bridgnorth, Shrewsbury and Ludlow Orchestras, Shropshire Chamber Orchestra, Wenlock Quintet, and am MD of Sunflower Saxes - a small sax ensemble made up from my students ages between 15 and 50+! I also accompany for exams and concerts and regularly work with Concordia Ladies Choir, Concordia Youth Choir and Cadence.

As you can see I like to play and teach a variety of genres of music, encouraging a love of music in my students whilst also sharing my love of music. I teach privately, at Haberdashers' Adams and Stottesdon Primary School. I started music aged 4 with the recorder, adding the piano and trumpet age 8 then I switched to clarinet whilst studying at Kent Centre for Young Instrumentalists on a Saturday finally adding saxophone whilst studying music at Cardiff University."

Dear Parent / Carer.

Unfortunately, we are again seeing a significant increase in complaints regarding vehicles being parked outside and near to local school premises.

We appreciate that many people have busy lives, and will be 'doing the school run' on the way to or from work but there can be few things more precious than a childs life – poor, inconsiderate or illegal parking puts your youngsters at risk!

It may be that when taking children to and from school by car, people need to allow a few extra minutes, park a little further away and walk the final short distance – some of our schools even operate 'walking bus' facilities for this exact purpose.

Please remember – parking on school zig zags and single yellow lines during their times of operation, double yellow lines, blocking junctions, pavements or driveways are all offences for which the police and authorised PCSO's can issue a £30 fixed penalty notice. If the matter goes to court the maximum fine is £1,000 plus court costs.

Given that our previous low key approach appears not to have had the desired effect, our team will now be taking a far more robust approach to enforcement of parking where the default position will be to 'ticket not warn'.

We also receive photographs taken by local residents and Walking Bus volunteers of incorrectly parked vehicles around our schools and will follow up on these reports when appropriate.

You should also be aware that responsibility for parking enforcement transfers from West Mercia Police to Telford & Wrekin Council on 13th January 2020, following which there will be a number of persons employed specifically to deal with parking issues and therefore enforcement will be more active.

We hope that you will consider your parking when dropping off / collecting children so that you are not the next recipient of a parking ticket from ourselves.


