ast Thursday saw the first round of Performance Tables released for all UK schools. Once again, NGHS has topped the tables for 2019. Progress scores are either positive or negative against the government's

expectation for each school and schools are also put into 'averages' brackets by the government. I have included these tables for schools with positive progress scores in Telford & Wrekin and Shropshire and in both cases NGHS is considerably ahead. This is wonderful news - well done again to all the students who sat examinations last summer; your hard work and support from teachers and parents has once again secured our position as the region's top performing school. 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Poetry Evening: A great success!



On Thursday 17 October the NGHS Literary Society and Sustainable NGHS combined forces, resulting in an eclectic evening of original and published poetry.

The theme for this year's event was the climate crisis, a topic which students are incredibly passionate about. There were also a number of poems were unrelated to the theme, allowing students to express their thoughts on a varied range of topics. Fourteen students from across the year groups performed their own original poetry along with published poems and there were also performances from five members of staff from the English, Geography and Maths departments: Miss Tomkinson, Mrs Capaldi, Mrs Gill, Rev Walters and Mr Postle.

The first half of the evening began with a poem by J. Lonsdale (Y13) called 'Poetry that Doesn't Rhyme'. The poem explored the process of

constructing a poem and it even included an embedded sonnet! Next, we moved on to original poetry on the theme of the climate crisis by students from across the year groups. There were also some moments of humour in the



first half, with O. Needham's (YII) poem on the challenges of handing your homework in on time resulting in many chuckles from the audience!




During the interval there was an opportunity for members of the audience to purchase refreshments and find out more about Sustainable NGHS, Sustainable Newport and the reusable Newport Cup. In the second half, there were more powerful poems about the climate emergency, a comic poem inspired by Halloween, a poem inspired by a character from a novel one of the students is currently writing and even a poem relating to an infamous card game!

Mrs Gill performed a powerful self-penned poem that drew inspiration from an open Geography text book and talked to audience about the work of the Sustainable NGHS group. Mrs Gill also read a poem by her own daughter and Rev Walters shared work from his daughter's university graduation show, a beautifully illustrated poem in the form of a children's book called 'Our Planet'. This really was a community event.

All in all, it was astounding to see the creative talents of students from Year 7 to Year 13 on full display and the audience were very moved by the readings. Many thanks to all the students and staff who were involved and to the PTA for providing the refreshments. This included four Year 12 English Literature students, who helped with the refreshments and running front of house. We would also like to thank Sustainable Newport for allowing us to sell their reusable coffee cups.

Black History Month Exhibition

Recently, fifteen-year eight students were privileged to visit an exhibition regarding Black History Month, an important month which celebrates the significant events in Africa's development. The event was first recognized in America but is now celebrated in Canada, the UK, Germany and the Netherlands.

During our visit, we got to experience different cultures and acknowledge Africa's history before the Slave Trade as well as the contributions of people of African origin to modern music, science and culture. The people running this event were volunteers from TAARC who wanted to share their culture so we could understand Black History month from another perspective.

TIM MILNER REVISION EVENING

On Tuesday 8
October almost all of
the YII pupils and
parents spent a very
productive couple of
hours involved in an
interactive workshop
on revision with Tim
Milner, an education
specialist. Tim's style
of presenting was
really engaging,



amusing and enjoyable and he had some fantastic tips, techniques and advice to help us make the most of our revision sessions. Many of his key points are definitely things I will take on board.

Tim showed us some great ways to get organised and plan revision and explained the science behind why 25-minute bursts, with a five-minute break, is the best way to maximise your time. Essentially, you've only just started, full of enthusiasm and before that feeling wears off, you're heading to the end of the session, so you stay engaged throughout. Top tip!

Tim explained the importance of keeping it 'simple' and 'personal' and 'memorable' (pictures and even emojis can be a great memory aid) and we had the opportunity to put what we were learning into practise the whole way through. He also showed how 'revisiting' revision 3 times works and how combining testing yourself often along the way really helps you retain information.

Tim has got loads of resources for us to mix it up, keep it 'varied' so keeping it interesting. His advice was 'just to get going'. Make a start. He also made us consider what he calls 'exam commands' to make sure you focus on what's actually being asked of you in an exam question, so you answer in the right way.

All Tim's ideas are relevant to all students in all year groups and fifteen minutes on his web site would be time well spent for all girls (from where all the relevant resources can be downloaded for free too!). timmilner.info and search 'exam'.

Overall, a very worthwhile session.
