INVESTIGATING GERMAN MODAL VERBS

Breaking the Code at Bletchley Park

Bletchley Park was home to Britain's top codebreakers (made up of mathematicians, linguists, cryptographers to name a few) in the Second World War. Last Friday, almost all of Year 11 attended a trip there to learn more

about the legacy of the people involved and how they managed to crack the Enigma code, something that was thought to be impossible. It was interesting learning about the impact this had on the war and how it dramatically reduced the number of yearly casualties without the general public even knowing about it.

The activities for the day included an independent tour of the buildings used during wartime, all fully fitted with contemporary equipment that would have been used at the time, as well as a guided tour, where our guide taught us in detail about the use and suitability of Bletchley Park, as well as the type of people that commonly worked there – young educated women. We were also able to take part in a codebreaking workshop where we could utilise one of the only remaining Enigma machines (see right) open to the public.

Overall the day was extremely interesting and helped us understand the importance of the impact their work had on our country, and I am very pleased I had the opportunity to attend.

Regional Maths Challenge

Last week, two Y12s and two Y13s travelled to Stafford to take part in the Regional Senior Maths Challenge, where we competed against 18 other teams from across the West Midlands.



We were apprehensive as to what we'd signed up for – I was convinced I was going to be taking part in a high-pressure, buzzers-at-the-ready fast paced maths quiz, fighting directly against an opposing team, having assumed all Mathematics Competitions were based on Mean Girls. Thankfully, the day was far from it! We turned up to chocolate cookies, badges and some practice maths questions, and began to seize up our competition.

The first round lasted 40 minutes, and was, rather simply, a list of 10 questions that we had to solve. Scoring 8/10 shot us up to joint 4th, giving us a boost of confidence as we entered the second round: a number crossword. The twist was that we had to split our team into pairs – with each pair having half the clues, and many clues relying on answers we had got for previous ones. Teamwork, mathematical skill and some more cookies helped us get through with only 7 of 65 points lost. By that point, we were ready to face our final challenge, one that lead to panicked shouting, banging heads and plenty of frantic scribbles as we attempted to solve 4 rounds of 4 questions with only 8 minutes per round. As each question relied on the answer to the one before, it was certainly a test of pressure and trust, and I am proud to say that we ended the day in 8th place!

The afternoon was, for me, an entertaining and crazy eyeopener into how a stereotypically 'individual' subject can be livened up with the help of fun problems, new challenges, and, of course, team spirit!

Buses on Friday 20 December


