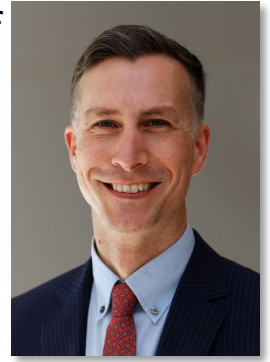

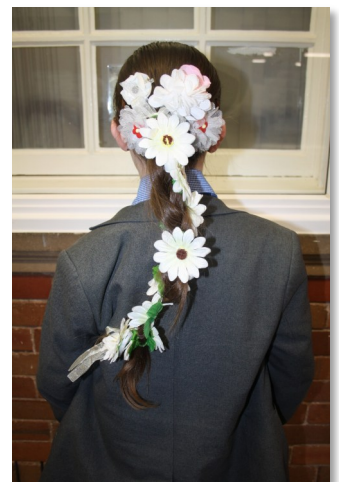

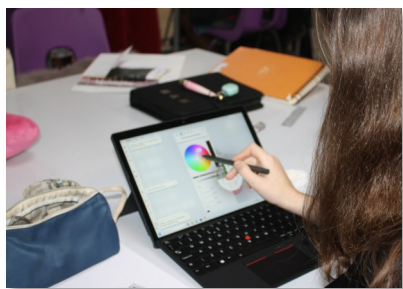

## INVESTING IN LEARNING: NEW DIGITAL DEVICES FOR OUR STUDENTS



We are pleased to share an update on a significant recent investment in digital learning at Newport Girls' High School and to highlight the important role that our parent community has played in making this possible.

The school has recently purchased 60 new Microsoft Surface laptops, housed in two new laptop trolleys, along with 30 Windows tablet devices. These new devices will be in use across the school after half term and will enhance learning in classrooms, supporting students with research, collaboration, creativity, and independent work.

This investment represents a major commitment by the school to strengthening our digital provision. We are equally grateful that parent donations through the NGHS School Development Fund have made a meaningful contribution towards the overall cost, helping us to expand what we were able to deliver and to do so more quickly and effectively.



When the NGHS School Development Fund was launched, its initial focus was to support our digital learning strategy by increasing and upgrading the number of devices available to students. Thanks to parental support, we have been able to take a significant step forward towards that goal, ensuring more students have access to high-quality, reliable technology during the school day.

The phrase shared with parents — “Every £1 donated will become a device in a student's hands” — was never intended to suggest that donations alone would fund projects in their entirety. Rather, it reflects how contributions directly add value, extend provision, and make visible improvements to students' day-to-day experience. The devices pictured alongside this article are a clear example of that impact.

Importantly, the NGHS School Development Fund is not a one-off initiative. We will be continuing the fund next year, with future projects shaped by school priorities and the evolving needs of our students. Contributions will continue to be ring-fenced and used to support tangible improvements that benefit learners across the school.

On behalf of staff and students, I would like to thank all parents and carers who have contributed to the NGHS School Development Fund. Your support is helping us to enhance learning now, while also enabling us to plan confidently for future developments that will continue to improve opportunities for our students.

We look forward to sharing further updates in Newport News as new projects come to fruition.

Here at NGHS there are a multitude of clubs covering everything from sports, to music to drama to crochet! On a Thursday afternoon we are extremely fortunate to be able to offer fencing to the students at school which is delivered by coaches from Wrekin Sword Club. We caught up with Year 9 student, Isabella P, who gave us her thoughts on why she loves fencing club:



*"I've been coming to fencing club now since I started at NGHS in Year 7. It's a really fun sport and something a bit different. The equipment can be a bit expensive but here at school you can use all of Wrekin Sword Clubs equipment. The style of fencing we do is called 'foil' but there are also 'epee' and 'sabre'. If you were to give it a go you do get the odd bump and bruise but nothing too bad! If you are unsure about whether to give it a try, there is a free taster session and then if you do decide to take it up, it is £5 per session"*



Fencing club is on every Thursday from 4.00pm to 5.30pm and is run and organised by the father and son coaching team of Ken and Andrew from Wrekin Sword Club. Sessions are £5 per time and that includes use of all of the equipment you will need.

## ANTHEA BELL PRIZE FOR YOUNG TRANSLATORS!

This year, our new MFL ambassadors have launched the Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators. The competition is inspired by the life and work of the great translator Anthea Bell. It aims to promote language learning across the UK and to inspire creativity in the classroom. Launched in 2020, the Anthea Bell Prize is free to enter and open to pupils aged 11-18 at all schools across the UK.

The Prize currently offers French, German, Italian, Mandarin, Russian and Spanish. The 2025-2026 Prize started on 19 September 2025, in time for European Day of Languages (26 September) and International Translation Day (30 September). 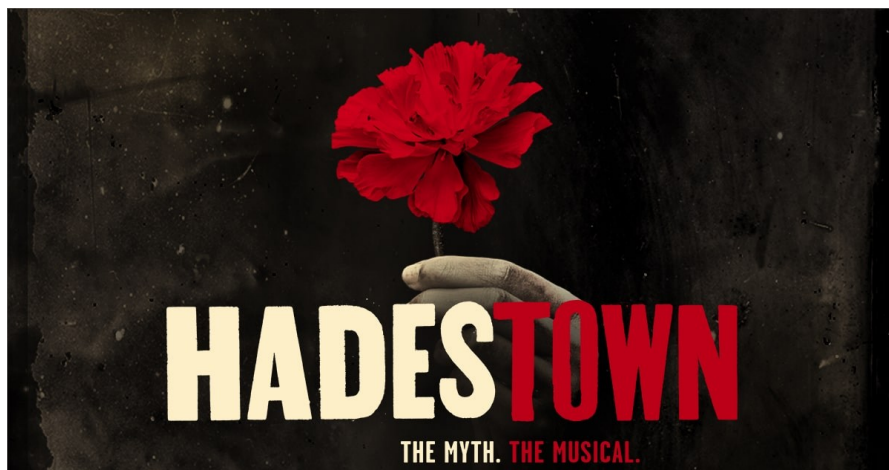
# THEATRE TRIP TO LONDON

As a Cambridge graduate, Georgia told us about the college she

had applied to – the beautiful St Johns College. She discussed the differences between the colleges, and how important it is for students to think about where their passions lie if they are considering the unique pathways that both Cambridge and Oxford offer. Aside from the collegiate system, the opportunity for weekly supervisions with respected academic specialists was emphasised, along with all the learning facilities and beautiful surroundings that you would expect. As Access Officer, Georgia gave a fantastic overview to students about the application process, and was able to answer questions and give a really interesting and insightful glimpse into life at Cambridge.

# HOW TO GET IN TOUCH!

## COMMUNICATION WITH SCHOOL

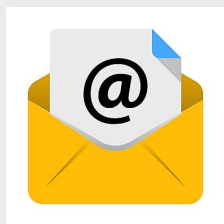
Over the course of the year, we will communicate with you in a variety of ways:

- Every two weeks, we publish **Newport News** on the school website. This document includes news from school, highlights upcoming events, and recent achievements. A link to each edition is sent home by email.
- An annual **Parents' Evening** to update you on your daughter's progress.
- **Grade sheets** and/or **written reports** to update you on your daughter's progress.
- An annual **parent information evening** to outline the key information relevant to each year group. This is in person for Year 7 and remote for other year groups.
- Relevant **letters** to your daughter are sent home via email.
- If teaching or pastoral staff have any concerns relating to your daughter, they will contact you **by phone** or **email**.

Occasions may arise when you need to contact the school to share information or raise concerns. There are several ways in which you can do this, including:

- By telephone – **01952 797550** – If possible, your call will be put through to an appropriate member of staff. Where this is not possible (member of staff is teaching/not in school/unavailable), a message will be taken and passed to an appropriate member of staff. You should expect a response to your call within 24 hours.
- By email – **schooloffice@nghs.org.uk** – You will receive an acknowledgement email once this has been received and be notified that the email has been passed to the appropriate member of staff (this may not always be to whom the email was addressed). You should then expect a response within 24-48 hours of this acknowledgement.
- By **letter** to the school.
- By **recording a note** in the communication section of your daughter's **planner** to be shared with a member of staff.

During school holidays, reception is closed and phone calls/emails cannot be responded to until we return to school. During the school holidays, **urgent@nghs.org.uk** is available to communicate key urgent information; it should not be used to send routine enquiries that can be responded to when school is open again. This account will be checked once every 24 hours by a senior member of staff. They will then make an appropriate response to any email that has been received.

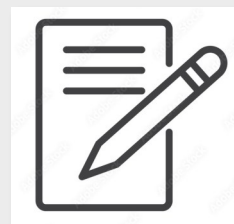
