

Despite the challenges that this year is presenting, we want to offer as many opportunities as we can to our students to help them make the best decisions they can for their future. During this year we also hope to offer virtual presentations about different jobs, and sectors, and again, if you would be prepared to offer an insight into your role, please get in touch. We are so grateful for your support.

This week has seen us host two more successful parent information evenings to year 7 and year 8 families. We have had positive feedback and hope that the families of our younger students feel well informed and clear on what is in store this year. We also saw our year 7 and year 8 students attend a Black History Month workshop. We welcomed Kirsty Holden, from the Multicultural Development Team at Telford and Wrekin Council, and Natalie Headley, who runs the Telford African and Afro-Caribbean Resource Centre in Telford, to our school. Our students explored the themes of identity, hidden histories and role models, and the importance of recognising black history as world history. More about

We will return to school on Monday 2nd November and will look forward to seeing our students again, raring to go for another half term of school life. The first school event is our parents evening for Year 10 on Wednesday 4 November through MS Teams.

She will teach indoor PE with Miss McCleary's help, but we have engaged a temporary PE teacher on a Friday to enable us to deliver the full outdoor PE curriculum safely without breaking 'bubbles'. 
May I finally wish you all a happy half term!



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BLACK HISTORY MONTH WORKSHOPS

Tuesday's Black History Month workshops, run by representatives of Telford and Wrekin's community cohesion team and TAARC, gave all year 7s and 8s an opportunity to learn more about a range of lesser known individuals, places and events in the extremely long and rich history of the continent of Africa. We reflected on the enormous geographical and cultural diversity of Africa and explored some of the architecture and objects that we can use to learn about history that was often not written, rather passed down orally in the traditional manner. We also had a brief introduction to a thousand years of African history and we were both surprised and pleased to learn of the important political role played by women in many African kingdoms. The workshops provided an excellent introduction to topics which will be studied in history lessons later this year, for example medieval Great Zimbabwe, which year 7 will be learning about, and the impact of the British empire on Africa and the West Indies which year 8 will be studying after half term. The interactive sessions also explored the role of individuals of black origin who have played an important part in British history, for example Mary Seacole, our NGHS house namesake, whose excellent work in the Crimea was little recognised elsewhere prior to this year.

Follow up work to the sessions has been completed in history lessons this week, with pupils choosing people, places or events that they want to learn more about and showcase within the theme of celebrating black history. Students are presenting their reflections in a number of ways, including poetry, prose and artwork. When all is complete we will be constructing a community collage as NGHS's celebration of black history month. We look forward to sharing this with you in an upcoming edition of the Newport News.


Year 13 Geography Field Trip





Road Closure Alert

Telford & Wrekin have informed us about a temporary road closure along **High Street**, **Edgmond** and **Longford Road Junction** To **Edgmond Split**, **Longford**.

Western Power Distribution are planning to undertake pole changes and reconductoring works. The work is set to commence on Wednesday 4th November 2020 and will last for a duration of 3 days between the hours of 9.30am and 3.00pm with an end date of Friday 6th November 2020.

The diversion route for vehicular traffic travelling southbound will be via High Street, Chetwynd Road, Edgmond Road, Chetwynd End, Lower Bar, Salters Lane, Longford Road, Longford Road Junction To Edgmond Split.

The diversion route for vehicular traffic travelling northbound will be vice versa.
