This week has seen our first joint project with Telford College. Year 7 and Year 8 students are taking part in Food Technology classes at TCAT on a Thursday morning. Mrs Birch took the first class yesterday and they had a lot of fun making a hearty mushroom soup in the catering kitchens. I know that Food Technology has been absent on our curriculum (owing to having zero facilities on site at NGHS) and I was delighted to find a solution to this for our younger students.

Staff Covid absences are still prevalent, albeit still below the reported national figures. I'd like to thank my absent colleagues for their stoic determination to keep teaching on Teams from home and to all students who have maturely and sensibly learnt via this method. Student absence numbers are still low, again by national standards and the reduction in isolation period will bring another change from Monday. As I mentioned back in September, the rules around Year I3s isolating were due to change in February with those who have birthdays in the first six months of the

academic year being treated as adults and potentially needing to isolate if unvaccinated. Things have gone quieter on that front but I will keep you updated. The School Vaccination Team are returning to NGHS in early February and the students in the I2-15 age bracket who are eligible for a first or second Pfizer dose should have received a pack of information via their child. Older students can book themselves in at a vaccination centre, if desired.

Our Year 13s have completed the application process to university and are holding a huge number of university offers between them. Others are exploring apprenticeship routes. We have news of some Oxford offers too and I will update you when Cambridge announce their offers later this month. Well done to all our Year 13s for completing this important stage in their life.

Lastly it was a pleasure to welcome a representative from the Newport Food Bank into Reception this afternoon to receive a cheque for £800 from the NGHS Family. This is money raised from our Winter Jumper Day, which almost all students and staff participated in back in December. The Food Bank team were incredibly grateful for our support which Mrs Supple (Leader) tells us will go towards food parcels for local families over the upcoming Easter break.

This was a new and unique way to deliver crucial information to a year group and this made it a memorable time. It almost seemed like Amber was having a personal conversation with us and telling us about her life story. Her characteristics and her lifestyle from the age of 11 were very relatable and allowed us to easily connect with her whilst learning from her life story.

Amber's story showed us the importance of knowing that we shouldn't simply follow the crowd because our majority may actually be the minority. We were informed that organisations, such as Childline, T3Stars (which is local) and Recharge, provided essential support for those who need help regarding this issue.

We all absolutely enjoyed watching the performance whilst learning much more about how easily young people can get into alcohol and drugs and the physical, mental and social impact they can have on us. Thank you to all the teachers who helped make this happen.

Gardening is a popular hobby for young and old; which supports physical exercise and emotional wellbeing. Research has shown that gardening therapy can help pupils who struggle with communication skills, building social relationships and who have sensory issues to develop these key skills overtime.

Gardening is a physical activity involving the use of the hands; it doesn't require much in the way of verbal skills. For those who are completely nonverbal, visual cues and photographs can be used to demonstrate tasks such as how to plant or care for seedlings.

Group gardening for example, supports young people with autism by allowing them to learn to work together towards a common goal. Creating an opportunity to engage in an activity that is slow paced and relaxing. This allows individuals to take in the different stimuli available (such as colour, smell, touch, sound and taste). It helps them learn to work together in a setting, ask for help, build confidence along with enhancing behavioural and communication skills.

Ultimately, gardening is something that everybody can get involved in. It may be frosty outside at the moment but you may want to consider growing some houseplants or getting wrapped up to go outside and tackle that overgrown shrub you have been meaning to do for a while! It promotes exercise, mindfulness and mental stimulation which are all good for the soul!
