The new building is complete!

I am delighted to confirm that we have now taken ownership of our new extension! From Monday, we will be teaching classes in Rooms 301-305 (upstairs in the new building) as well as enjoying food in the Dining Room and kitchen.

Outside, fresh turf is being put down but will require a few weeks to bed in. Students have been told, today, how to access the Field etc. in this interim period and have also received freshly-printed timetables with new rooms. I would like to first thank all the NGHS families who committed a financial donation to the building. In total we raised around £55,000; not quite the £74,357 we were hoping for and the figure of £55,000 included a generous donation from a charity to which I wrote a bid for IT equipment. Nevertheless, we have afforded most of what we hoped to give our students the best possible educational experience but have had to make some savings along the way. As the academic and financial year continues, we will continue to monitor our school budget and it will be tight this year! I would always be grateful for continued donations and hopefully you will hear about the new rooms (and probably the new toilets) from students!

Our classrooms are named by the families who made very generous donations to our Primed for Success campaign and also some were selected at random from those making a donation of \pounds 7.51 a month for 12 months, which is all we

asked at the start of the campaign. Classroom 304 is named 'The Don Steward Room' in memory of a much-loved NGHS former maths teacher who sadly passed away in the first few weeks of the Covid-19 pandemic.

The building project has been overseen by myself and Mrs Machin, our Finance and Facilities Manger at NGHS as well as architects Baart Harries Newall of Shrewsbury, Greenwood Consulting who were our Project Managers and of course Interclass of Wolverhampton who completed the build. I would like to thank them all for their commitment and support, particularly when issues arose surrounding the supply of materials and staffing shortages with Brexit and Covid; all of which added to the delay of a couple of months. Also, our group of parents and governors who helped fundraise, in particular Mrs Harris (Vice Chair of Govs) and Mrs Tunnicliffe (Auction Coordinator).

Next week our mobiles and outdoor toilet block will be lifted away (the latter won't be missed but we will actually miss the mobiles) and I will turn my attention to seeing what we can do to improve the north end of the site beyond the Courts to improve parking and PE facilities! As the number of students grows, I am committed to making the school the best it can be for the benefit of all students.

Last Friday, Year 12 were given the opportunity to attend an exciting talk by Dr Matthias Dörrzapf, the Director of Scholarships and International Programmes at St John's College, University of Cambridge. The talk covered all that we need to know about the university, including choosing a course, choosing the college that we would like to apply to, and the college structure in general. It was intriguing to hear about how all of the day-to-day learning at the University is organised by whichever of the 31 colleges you belong too, especially as the collegiate structure is something that is unique to just Oxford and Cambridge. Matthias also gave us some very helpful pointers about the application process, including shedding some light on what the interviewers are likely to be looking for in an interview at Cambridge.

While highlighting the importance of being able to hold an engaging discussion with the interviewers, Matthias reminded us that the people interviewing us would be likely become our teachers and peers (or perhaps have written a textbook that the university choose to study) and therefore it was vital to be able to connect to them on a personal level as well as an intellectual level.

All in all, it was great to learn more about such a prestigious university, and what life might actually look like at Cambridge. Thank you to Mrs Gill for organising this for us through the 6th form careers programme and to Mrs Griffin for introducing the speaker.
