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


atilda the Musical tickets are now on sale! The production runs for three nights in March and we are

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Second Place in Regional Finals

In December, we took part in a Cyber Security competition run by the GCHQ called CyberFirst Girls which over 7000 girls took part in. In these qualifying rounds over a series of days, we took part in challenges which were split into five sections: Logic and Coding, Cyber Security, Networking, Cryptography and Speciality. The challenges were worth points from 5-125 depending on difficulty and the aim was to collect as many points as you could as possible in your team of four.

The challenges aim to interest more girls into Computing and possible careers in Cyber Security as it is a male-dominated job, with only 16% of females working in cyber security. During these challenges we had to crack different types of cipher, hack pre-made websites, find hidden data and use our logic to work out complex problems.

After the qualifying round, there were 13 simultaneous finals for different regions which ran in the same format as the qualifying rounds, although the questions were more challenging. In the West Midlands final, we competed against eleven other teams, and we were the Clueless Coders with our mascot, Sam-Penny the pig. As Harnour was poorly, Harriet had to step in at the last minute to join our team. We started in ninth place, leapt up to third place and were in first place before lunch. Sadly, we were beaten into second place by the Bishop's Best from the Bishop Challoner School.

In the last few weeks, we have begun to explore and appreciate how the economy works, focusing on the wider economic environment, including government policy and its influence on the success of different types of businesses and consumers. In the current economic climate, with record inflation levels, this has become increasingly relevant in our analysis of current affairs.

Furthermore, our recent trip to Cadbury World aided us in developing our understanding of manufacturing and marketing, and the secrets to the company's astronomical success from the beginning to the end of the production process. We had the fascinating opportunity to listen to

This week, we have been looking at market failure and externalities, examining the wider impacts, both positive and negative, of our purchases on society, public health and the environment. The photograph shows an example from the class where we were set a task

to investigate the effects of online shopping. It required us to think outside the box to identify the costs and benefits of financial decisions that we may not have considered before.



Over the last two weeks, teachers at NGHS have been identifying a previously taught topic that students would benefit from revisiting. In some cases this is based on an analysis of assessment results, or it may be a topic taught in a previous year involving a challenging concept or theory. Using Rosenshine's Principles and considering the individual needs in their classroom, teachers have thought about how they could best approach this topic to further student understanding and address any misconceptions. The updated 5 minute lesson plan from the Teacher Toolkit has been used to facilitate their thinking and support with best practice.
