German Assistant Hosting

Since I have the goal to work as a teacher, I am studying English and Theology at the University of Wuppertal in Germany. From 25th April to 21st July 2022, I will work as a Teaching Assistant at Newport Girls' High School. About my arrival and departure dates, we would have to talk individually because in cooperation with my University Studies I need to be abroad for at least 90 days. I am looking for a homestay which can offer me a room of my own. A bathroom of my own is not obligatory. A family who lives close to Newport Girls' High School would be of great advantage, since I will be dependent on public transportation. WHAT'S HAPPENING IN BIOLOGY XY


Students Riding High on the Crest of a Wave!

For a number of years NGHS has had success with Y13 biology students completing the Gold Crest Award in collaboration with Harper Adams University. Achieving the Gold Crest Award requires practical research in the labs at Harper Adams University with a lecturer as a mentor, a written report and a presentation to the Harper academics and Crest peers. Jiaqi D was awarded her Gold Crest a few weeks ago for her original research into "Essential oils and their effect on aphids and a parasitoid enemy".



However this year has been very special with two students, Vinethma J and Amelia J, attending Harper Adams during the summer holiday to complete their Silver Crest Award. Their titles respectively, "The effect of glucose on gut cells modulated with lysophospholipids" and "RTgutGC cells dose response to lysophospholipids in vitro". When submitted to the British Science Association for marking, they were so impressed with the depth and quality of research, the students were awarded Gold instead of silver.

Meanwhile back in the classroom, year 8 have been honing their scientific thinking with an investigation into the effect of glucose on the rate of respiration in yeast. We cannot see yeast respiring so we have to devise a way to indirectly



measure the respiration rate. The students fed their yeast different masses of glucose and then made dough with the yeast. The faster the dough rises the faster the yeast are respiring. The students devised their own hypothesis and applied their knowledge of variables to carry out a valid investigation.

Year 10 have been getting to grips with biomass transfer through the trophic levels using modelling to help them. Coloured pasta helped the students to understand how biomass is lost as you go through a food chain.

Decay is the order of the day in YII. IIY students (pictured above) have been looking at home made compost complete with detritus feeders; worms and woodlice, working out what happens and why, where do all the dead things go? IIZ have taken this a step further, carrying out an investigation into the effect of temperature on the decay of milk. Students added the enzyme lipase to milk and measured the rate at which fatty acids were produced by measuring the pH. The more fatty acids the more acidic the solution becomes.

With **three** A-level biology groups now Year 12 at NGHS, the subject is thriving!

Law & Journalism: Alumnae Talk

Last Friday, we were visited by Samantha Smith, a school alumnus now studying law at Durham University, who came to talk about her experiences with studying law and her career in journalism.

Samantha has been published in several prominent national newspapers including The Daily Mail, the Telegraph and the Spectator, predominantly writing on education and social mobility. She talked us through both her writing process and how to build up a portfolio, emphasizing the role that social media can play in your career. It was through her activities on twitter during the 2020 A levels fiasco that provided her with the opportunity to write for her first national newspaper. Whilst almost every student will have some form of social media, few of us have considered it as a way to launch our careers in addition to connecting with our friends.

Samantha also discussed the merits of a gap year in helping to build connections within the legal and political sector. Before going to university, she worked in the office of the Telford MP Lucy Allen which helped her to create connections in London and Westminster as well as local politics whilst allowing her to continue studying and pursuing journalism. This provided insight into ways to effectively build up your career and portfolio and how best to use a gap year.

Discussing her experiences as a first-year law student, Samantha addressed the expectations of a law course as well a balancing academic commitment with other commitments including social life and work. Law is a demanding degree and for many of the students present, the ability to balance the workload is a significant concern. Samantha helped to assure us that whist law is demanding, with the effective time management, you can manage work, social commitments and your education. She also talked us through the structure of her course, and the teaching styles that are used, helping many of the year 12 students gain new perception of



what studying law will be like in practice. In addition, she discussed future career prospects, and the role a university can play in securing a training contract which helped dissuade some of our fears over these lucrative roles.

This visit provided useful insight into beginning a career in journalism and what it's like to study law at one of the top Universities in the UK. We are immensely grateful that Samantha gave up her time to come and talk to us about her experiences and share some invaluable advice. **I Nicklin, Year 12**
