

# Malham Tarn - Biology Residential

Last Friday, a cohort of Year 12s went to Malham Tarn in the Yorkshire Dales as part of an A-level Biology Ecology Field Trip. When we arrived, we ate our lunch and immediately started the first activity in which we gained knowledge on how to use quadrats, which was a key piece of equipment we would use throughout our investigations on the trip.

After this, we went on a hike to study lithosere succession on a limestone scree slope, using the quadrat techniques we had just learnt. The walk up the lithosere (a rocky cliff face) entailed a few trips, like Anvita who lost her footing on the uneven rocks.

On this project, we were introduced to the kit commonly used in ecology including the photometer (which measures light intensity), a soil compaction device and hygrometer (which measures humidity). After a tasty sausage and mash dinner, we went to the classrooms to do our first statistical test on our investigation into the association between species richness and succession down the lithosere. The final activity of the day was mammal trapping. We each put together an ethical and humane mouse trap filled with lots of straw and food for the mouse to eat. Later on, everyone gathered in the common room in the High Stables to watch Love Island and play cards. We got an early night's sleep ready for the full day ahead.

On Saturday, we woke up early, had a full English and checked our traps from the night before. To our surprise not only were we one of two groups who caught a mouse, but we also caught Stumpy –

the “celebrity” mouse of the area. He seemed very content to be shown around and even posed for some pictures. We then released Stumpy where we found him and watched him scurry off into the woodland with a full belly of apple and mealworms (yum!). This meant we started our day on a high, and we had a very enjoyable walk to the freshwater ecosystem, 1.5 miles away from Malham Tarn House where we were staying. Here we collected samples of invertebrates that we found in the river and identified them using ID cards – we caught species such as swimming mayfly's, freshwater shrimps, riffle beetles and even a tadpole!

When back at Tarn House, we did further stats tests before our next investigation began on the comparison of biodiversity between grazed and ungrazed grassland. After dinner, we planned our Required Practical for the Sunday morning. We decided to investigate the association of two species of plant (Salad Burnett and Buttercup) and their habitat (woodland and open grassland).

On Sunday, after another early start we successfully collected our data with time to spare and then headed home. Overall, we all thoroughly enjoyed the weekend and not only improved our understanding of ecology but also gained practical skills that we will carry forward in our studies. A massive thank you to Mrs Han, Mrs Dainty and Mr Tolley for organising the trip and spending their weekend with us. Finally, a special mention must go to Liv A who managed to ‘kill’ the most people on the trip (if you know, you know!)
