Student Groupings 2022-2023

We have considered carefully how our timetable and class organisation will work from September in the hope of realigning to the strong system we had in pre-Covid days. We have been on a gradual return to this during the current school year and we have updated our grouping policy on our website to reflect these changes for September. The information below relates to new year groups (i.e. current Year 7s should read the section for Year 8 etc.) Students will discover their who their new form tutor is and where their new form room is in the last week of term. Many form tutors will stay with their forms and most Heads of Year will do the same for continuity.

New Year 8s

New Year 9s

Students will remain in the same teaching groups (N,G,H,S) as this year. However, we will make changes to form groups to bring these back to House forms (Austen I-3, Roddam I-3 and Seacole I-3). These forms will be shared with new Year 7s. This will enable Year 8s to play a greater role in mentoring new students to the school. The Head of Year going forward for this year group will be Mrs A Seys in our new rolling Head of Year system.

Students will remain in their Austen, Roddam, Seacole form groups and will be upstairs on the languages corridor. Please rent lockers on this corridor! Students will begin their GCSE courses so will be in newly mixed groups for all subjects dependent upon the subjects they have chosen. They will be broadly set for maths and in three mixed groups for science, English and PE. Ms J Capaldi will continue as their Head of Year.

New Year 11s

Students remain in their form groups (Austen, Roddam and Seacole) and will be housed in our brand new Maths classrooms as form rooms. They will continue with the same teaching groups as in Year 10 and almost always with the same teacher unless s/he is leaving NGHS. Mrs S Tomkinson is our Head of Year 11 but is on maternity leave at present. Mrs D Martin, Wellbeing Officer and Teacher of PE will therefore be Head of Year in the autumn. She has held this role with our current Year 11 already.

New Year 10s

Students will remain in their form groups and classes for English, Science, PE and maths (barring any set changes). They will move classes in option subjects dependent upon the subject they are not continuing with and may or may not have the same teacher dependent upon the groups they join. However, staff are experienced in ensuring all groups are at the same point in the course by the end of this term. Mrs A Chapman continues as Head of Year.

Sixth Form

Students remain in their form groups (Austen, Roddam and Seacole) and these will continue to be mixed with Year 12 / Year 13 students, as this year. Mrs Griffin, Mr Pointon and Mrs Martin continue in their roles in leading the sixth form.

On Wednesday, the SustaiNGHS team attended Telford and Wrekin's first Youth Climate Summit at Enginuity, Ironbridge. Telford and Wrekin council who declared a climate emergency in 2019 - organised the event in the hopes to "demystify" what we already knew about climate change, and encourage us to think about what we do that leaves an impact on the planet, and positive steps we can take to ensure our environmental impact is as sustainable as possible.

Throughout the day, a number of climate change and environmental experts spoke to us about a vast array of areas which relate to our planet and local area. Several professors from local universities and experts from Telford end Wrekin Council delivered talks on their different specialist areas, all of which were focussed on different aspect of the environment, sustainability, and our how our actions effect the planet. We started the day with a True or False activity to quickly dispel a range of misconceptions about the climate and climate change, before launching into a lecture from Prof. Widman on the past and future of Earths climate, and the difference of the effects of natural factors and human factors on the environment. Afterwards, Ian Wykes from Telford and Wrekin council spoke to us about Wildlife and Biodiversity in the UK, and how a changing climate will impact the species that live here. We learnt about the complexity of factors that lead to the extinction of animals - loss of prey due to migration pattern change, loss of habitat due, increase in predator numbers – and how it is not just a simple as 'climate change.' We also learn that Hammerhead sharks have been seen in the UK for the first time due to warmer waters!

After, we had a fantastic interactive session led by Susanne Bearblock, who has numerous job titles but focuses on education and the environment. Through this session, we were able to have



our say on the climate action we wanted to see in Telford, and had the change to deliver our groups opinions and 'even better ifs' to the room, which included nearly 100 students, scientists, and ClIr Catherine Heely from Telford and Wrekin Council. We then had lunch (all plant based) and had the opportunity to explore the museum briefly before heading back into a session led by Dr Komali Yenneti from Wolverhampton University, where we took on the roles of different countries and used a computer program to try and implement climate deals to get global warming to under 1.5C. We all found it exceptionally difficult without drastic action!

Veolia, who manage waste disposal in Telford, taught us about the importance and scale of recycling and other waste management techniques, as well as the changes we can make in our lives to reduce the amount of rubbish which goes to landfill. They also showed us several examples of bigger companies such as McDonald's and Costa working with Veolia to try and use their waste for good. To wrap up the day, we had a final talk from Prof. Andrew Beacham from Harper Adams on the future of global food supplies and sustainable crops and farming, which was my favourite part of the day. Rae Anyidoho, the Youth Parliament representative for Telford and Wrekin finished off the day, delivering a speech on how climate news is not all doom and gloom, and how our positive actions have a positive climate impact. This was especially important to me, hearing someone our own age taking climate action and education into their own hands.

Last week, it was Curriculum Enrichment Week for all the years. The year 12s did a week of sessions based around their next steps, including university applications, apprenticeships and their EPQ. Although this is a very daunting time, the sessions throughout the week really helped in getting us started, answering any questions we had and making the thought of our futures less overwhelming.

The Friday before CEW, we went to the University of Birmingham Open Day where we got to spend the day looking around and going to talks based on the courses we want to take. This was a great opportunity to get a feel for the university and then use it to compare with other open days we attend in the future.

On Monday, we started our UCAS application with the help of Mrs Griffin and Mrs Bailey. We also had the choice of two talks in the afternoon. One was about student finance and budgeting with a guest from Staffordshire University and the other was all about apprenticeships with guests from ASK, Microsoft and a year 13 who has a place on a degree apprenticeship. These talks were incredibly useful and helped us think about what we want to do and also prepare for university.

On Tuesday, we went to the UCAS fair in Liverpool. Here, we had the opportunity to speak to as many universities as possible and ask any questions. This enabled us to find out more about the universities and courses they offer as well as get as many free tote bags as possible! It was a very enjoyable day. The following day, we focused on writing our personal statements and got our first drafts started with the help of our teachers. Then in the afternoon, it was the Rounders House Cup and even though it rained, the house spirit was not dampened. The winners were Seacole!



On the final day, we focused on our EPQ and did activities based on referencing. In the afternoon, it was the year 12 induction where all the possible new year 12s spent an afternoon together. Year 8 Water Testing

On Thursday, year eight was split into two groups. we began the morning with a physics activity. In this we were tasked with building bridges out of 120 straws and tape. Each team was trying to make a bridge which could hold the largest weight; my team won with our bridge holding 2.1kg. Later, we walked to our local stream and collected water from our allocated spot.

After, we were were split into two groups to chemically and biologically analyse our samples. When chemically analysing, we tested for nitrate, nitrite, pH, ammonia and the general hardness of the water. During our biological analysis, we observed for any microorganisms that were in our water sample. Some of us were fortunate enough to find larger organisms such as worms and water mites.

I thoroughly enjoyed the day and thank all the teachers who helped.
