Last weekend, the year 12 geography class went on a field trip to Cumbria, which was a brilliant way for us to collect the data for our NEA investigation. Despite being found in the wettest part of the UK, our youth hostel didn't live up to this name as we were bombarded with sunshine. Safe to say the raincoats stayed at the bottom of our bags.

After arriving at school bright and early at 5.50am Friday morning, we made our way up to Cumbria. Our first stop was Mawbray banks, to collect data on the sand dunes. Despite the wind, we were able to get the job done without disturbing the local toads in the dune slacks. Despite not being able to interview anyone at first, some students were able to chat to some workers cutting the grass about the coastal management of the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

After dinner each evening, which for some entailed a jacket potato for 3 days straight, we all walked down to the local village hall to consolidate our data collection from that day. It had the most beautiful view of the fells, with cows within smelling distance of the hall's balcony.

Day two saw our cohort visit Keswick in the morning and Workington in the afternoon, with a speedy stop at McDonald's for lunch. In these towns, we were interviewing both tourists, locals and business owners about a plethora of topics, from their sense of place, to the impact of COVID or regeneration in their town. It's safe to say that all of our confidence grew massively on this trip and I would be surprised to find a shop in either location that an NGHS pupil hadn't attempted to interview in.

Day three was led by the Field Studies Council, who taught us more about data collection, with the main entertainment by Mr Pimm who stealthily jogged down a steep rocky path in order to relay information between two sets of students, giving Bear Grylls a run for his money.

After the longest hike of our entire life up to the top of a fell, we arrived at a grassland area to investigate infiltration rates of soil, to then compare with woodland infiltration. Hammering the tubes into the ground saw Mollie's karate debut as she hit the tube so hard into the ground her mallet snapped in half. We also took calculations which we then used to measure the amount of carbon one tree can store, which was great to be able to use our calculations in a real-life scenario. If we had a pound for every person that slipped on the way down the mountain, we could have funded the group's snack budget. At the end of the day, we had a movie night which saw both Mr Pimm and Mrs Gill fully immersed in a romantic-comedy film. Mr Pimm was also able to practise his limbo skills under a blind to get to the balcony, whilst Mrs Gill simply pulled the blind back up to elegantly walk through.

On our last day, after a full English breakfast, we made our way over to Cockermouth, for our last data collection. We received a whistle stop tour courtesy of Mr Pimm of the various flood defences and the confluence between the river Cocker and Derwent. This was really interesting especially for those that were at NGHS for GCSE as this was a prior case study of ours. The weather again was blue skies all around, however my horsefly bites covering my leg were slightly distracting from the views.

We all had a brilliant time and were able to bond together as a group better as well as getting to know our teachers more. A huge thank you to Mr Pimm, Mrs Gill and Mrs Taylor for organising the trip and putting up with us all for 4 days: we had a blast!

Digital Leaders visit Moorfield Primary

Last Friday, a group of digital leaders went to Moorfield Primary School to host a Computing workshop. We were a team of 9 students and Mr Ley. Our main aim was to encourage year 4 students to take an interest in



computer science, and to give the pupils an example of girls leading in computer science. As this was our first time doing such event, we ran this as a pilot test with 15 students from year 4 to see how it works out. The workshop consisted of three stations: Coding, Computational Thinking and Cyber Security. Prior to the event, Isla and Daisy (Yr. 8), created a scratch program which the yr4 students at Moorfield had to personalise to make their own. Computational thinking, led by Annabelle (Yr. 10) and Piper (Yr.9) involved the children working together to solve riddles. One of the riddles was the famous riddle of the fox, chicken and grain. In the cyber safety workshop, created by Rutvi (Yr. 10), we taught the children 'how to keep their grandparents safe' from spam emails, text messages and phone calls. On the whole this workshop went really well and we plan on doing other workshops with a larger group of pupils. A big thank you to Rutvi, Annabelle (Yr.10), Oak, Piper, Anna (Yr. 9), Aimee, Lara, Daisy and Isla (Yr. 8) and of course Mr Ley for organising this as well as Mr Bussey at Moorfield Primary School for allowing us to visit.



Last Tuesday, we went on a fabulous trip to see the thirtieth anniversary production at Stafford Castle of 'Romeo + Juliet'. Upon arrival, we were faced with the task of climbing up a steep hill which, though beautifully covered in fairy lights, felt a little like a Duke of Edinburgh expedition! However, it was all worth it in the end, as the stunning scenery of the castle, accompanied with the gorgeous 'fair Verona' set that lay before us were enough to take our breath away.

Though the well-renowned play of the ill-fated couple is a story that most of us were already familiar with, the performance itself was massively captivating, and kept us all on the edge of our seats. Whether it be the grip of fate on the two star-struck lovers, or the comedic character of the nurse, every scene had something for everyone.

The traditional Early Modern English used throughout the performance was a beautiful and challenging aspect

of the performance. Although the play itself was written centuries ago, the performance incorporated some fresh and fun references to modern life. In a Bridgerton-like fashion, the performance included medieval orchestra versions of modern-day songs, a personal favourite being "Shivers" by Ed Sheeran and an indirect reference to the tiktok dance of "Blinded by the Light" by The Weekend. This added a refreshing element to the play, and was particularly enjoyed by the audience.

As well as this, the play managed to tackle some more serious modern issues in the overarching themes, including the pulling down of statues and their place in society, and how hate and miscommunication can spread and destroy lives. Overall, the performance was fabulous and we all had a great time! Thank you to all the staff for taking us to see the play.
