eek five already and as you will see in this week's Newport News there's lots going on at NGHS. Returning to school this September has been a more difficult adjustment after a protracted period of

disruption and finding a rhythm and balance after a period of loss and disturbance is difficult for some of us (students and staff alike). I continue to be impressed and grateful to everyone in our NGHS family for their support and cooperation at this time and thank parents and carers for their trust in the school. This appears to have been tested a little this week with a rise in cases in our community (Telford & Wrekin is unfortunately seeing a continued high plateau of cases). I would politely remind parents that NGHS is (and has always) done more than is expected of schools with regard to Covid mitigation and whilst I understand that any disruption to learning is unfortunate, the figures reported in the national press this week (relating to the percentage of students missing schooling nationally through Covid illness) are quite a lot higher than at NGHS.

This week I was able to attend the Grammar Schools Heads conference and I was reassured that not only are we doing a lot to support students in this stage of the pandemic, but also our cases are considerably lower; some schools were reporting up to 200 students absent and over 20 staff. We will continue to work hard to manage cases and Teams lessons, in line with government protocol, but the rules around isolation did change in September with Track & Trace managing the sourcing of close contacts. Students who become aware of peers with whom they have sat close to in the 48 hours prior to a positive result are always encouraged to seek a PCR test. Teams lessons are available for students who have tested positive on a PCR test for their 10 days of absence etc. Lateral flow testing twice weekly is also appreciated and has identified some asymptomatic cases. I have tried to order more tests into school, but as yet none of arrived, hence me sending the email requesting families source their own through this link. If you do need to report a positive PCR test result to the school, please do email **urgent@nghs.org.uk** but remember to include your child's name, form and the date until which they must isolate at home. Thank you.

Today is **HELLO YELLOW DAY** and our pastoral team are celebrating positive mental health in our NGHS family. There's lots happening at lunchtime and NGHS is looking very yellow once again! Thank you to all the staff and students who have contributed to this important day.

Wednesday night saw our first PTA meeting in a long time and we had around 20 families attending. Thank you so much to everyone who joined the meeting. A number of fundraising ideas were discussed and Miss Webster, Deputy Head, who is our senior staff link to the PTA is working with the PTA Chair, Mrs Fairhead, to implement some of these in our calendar. It's great to see the enthusiasm of parents to help fundraise for our school. Thank you!

Finally, I would like to congratulate our U14 Netball Team who have become County Champions. They move onto the West Midlands competition at Bromsgrove in January and I am packing my thermals for a day in freezing temperatures on the court side! 

WHAT'S GOING ON IN... DRAMA

As you will be aware, Drama has been added to our Year 7 and Year 8 curriculum at NGHS since September. In a temporary classroom (for now), our youngest two year groups have made the most of this exciting opportunity as Mrs Saysell attests:

In their Introduction to Drama unit, Year 8 have been exploring the process of developing a character. Students began by analysing the importance of non-verbal communication to depict a character's personality, traits and their character's relationship with others. In more recent weeks, students have started to consider vocal elements, by exploring pitch, volume, tone and register to help convey a three-dimensional character. In this session 8A were required to consolidate and apply their learning to the exploration of a scripted monologue. Initially, students identified the motivation of the character and then applied their vocal and physical skills to convey this intention to the audience. Despite not studying Drama previously, 8A, along with the rest of Year 8, have truly embraced the subject- they are a pleasure to teach!







Black History Month

For the first time in two years, our Year 12s have managed to visit Liverpool for their induction weekend. As you can see from the photographs, a great time was had by all.

The trip to Liverpool was an amazing experience both culturally and academically, with brilliant opportunities to explore the city with old and new friends. Having not spent much time in large cities before, I found that the freedom we were given to roam enabled me to spend time visiting the places that interested me most.

The trip to see Beauty And The Beast on the first night was very entertaining, although I shudder to think of the momentous task it must have been to clear all glitter off of the stage afterwards. Arguably the best part of it was Lumière, who was played by Gavin Lee.

The Beatles Bus Tour on the Saturday morning was cold, although we were all given some stylish red plastic ponchos by a very enthusiastic tour guide. Whilst also telling us about Liverpool's general history, we were taken to some landmarks of the Beatles' history, including the painted Penny Lane sign and John Lennon's childhood home, where he lived with his aunt although frequently snuck out to visit his mother down the road.

On our return, we were allowed to go and explore Liverpool ourselves. Having looked through and planned where we wanted to go previous to the trip, we managed to fit in most of what we wanted to do. I spent the majority of my time in Bold Street, where there were a great many interesting cafés and local business. There were also some brilliant book shops such as Forbidden Planet and 'News of the world' – a feminist book shop where my friends and I ended up taking home a number of interesting titles that I have continued reading since we arrived back, such as forgotten female authors-part of a trilogy-queer romances, and a smaller book on the effect of the class structure on mental health. I would recommend browsing their online catalogue as it contains literature and authors that unfortunately often get buried.

We had also booked an hour at the Cat Café at the bottom of the street, where we had a lovely time reading our new finds and petting two of the cats: Robert and Rose. We were also given unlimited refills on hot and cold drinks, which didn't hurt.

Before we left for Bella Italia, where we had booked ourselves in for dinner, we visited the World History Museum for a few hours. Although we didn't have time to look through the entire building, we looked inside their small aquarium section and spent a few hours looking at their section on Asia. Mrs Martin's quiz that evening was very competitive, but we managed to keep the teachers from first place, winning some snazzy Beatles badges.

Of course, everyone else will have done different things in their time, but that just shows how much there is to do. Losing time to getting lost in the rain is not something you want to do, so raincoats and google maps are a must for anyone considering to go on this trip in the future — it really is something you have to make the most of while you're there.







YEAR 11 GEOGRAPHERS NAVIGATE LONDON

After rising before dawn with the early morning joggers - who we thought for a second were Mr Pimm making a last ditch run for it - two classes of geography students boarded the coach, Dave at the helm, and we set off. We watched the sun rise, driving past a lot of trees probably and marvelling at the huge wind turbines ("Solar power!!... Amazing."- Cordy), arriving at Canary Wharf in good time. The museum was a converted 200-year-old warehouse on the Thames, in West India Quay with a lot of very interesting and relevant exhibits for our Docklands regeneration case study, and we especially liked the reclaimed boat stairs which were fun and also squeaky. Having regrouped outside, we walked through the Isle of Dogs to the entrance of No. I Canada Square to survey the highflying business people- renowned for being down for a chat- during their lunch hour. Surveying was surprisingly fun and spirits were high as we returned to the coach, having collected data on the people, the land use and the environmental quality of the area.

We arrived at Westfield Shopping Centre for lunch; some of us brought sandwiches; some of us bought I

litre of strawberry milk and some of us just took one big, energising sniff of the lush store and coasted off that for the rest of the day. Rested and recuperated, we marched down the road to the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, another of the massive regeneration projects of London's East End we'd studied. We surveyed the general public, did a pedestrian count, filled out another environmental quality index and caused an absolute scene at the pavement fountains.

We then toured the Aquatic Centre, surrounding nature reserve and velodrome all impressively built on a brownfield site having recycled 2 million tonnes of soil, and finishing at the Timber Lodge Café; an initiative to employ people with learning disabilities, where we stopped and discussed the conversion of the Olympic Village into the East Village and took a lot of pictures of bins whilst observing the street furniture. We found Dave and the coach, and travelled home as the sun sunk below the blades of the wind turbines and all the early morning joggers got back in their beds, and drifted off to sleep.
