#### Notice from Newport Safer Neighbourhood Team:

The Police often receive reports of illegal and inconsiderate parking in the streets around our local schools. Whilst we appreciate that some people have no option but to drive to school, we are appealing that drivers take a little extra time to make this journey to alleviate some of the congestion found at these peak times and when parking do so with consideration of others.

It is recognised that there are more cars on the road than when most schools were built and it is also recognised that most schools do not have sufficient parking or drop off points. On-street parking is something that is utilised far more due to this reason. The knock on effect of this is that our roads are busier and more congested, particularly in the period before and after school. The Safer Neighbourhood Team are working with our schools, the Town Council and local residents to address some of the concerns raised and to improve the safety of people using our roads.

The purpose of this letter is to set out the legality of the issues raised and to hopefully address these so that people are reminded how and where they are to park.

The Safer Neighbourhood Team wish to appeal to the good nature of drivers when considering parking vehicles on the road and to remind them of the following offences:

- S137 of the Highways Act 1980. This section provides an offence of wilful obstruction of the highway.
- Regulation 103 of the Road Vehicles (Construction &Use) Regulations 1986. This regulation provides an offence causing an unnecessary obstruction on a road.
- S28 Town Police Clauses Act 1847. This section provides an offence of obstruction of the footpath.

The Safer Neighbourhood Team do not want this to escalate into an issue where we must come and enforce the above offences. Our advice would be that if you park on the road, please be considerate of local residents and consider how easy it would be for them to leave their driveway or negotiate the increased traffic near to their homes. An obstruction offence would be made out if there was sufficient evidence that a person has parked in such a way to prevent them from leaving their property. If a vehicle was parked in such a way that hinders, but does not obstruct, then the offence would not be made out, however please consider the effect that this hindrance has on local residents and the possible safety implications this would have for them struggling to leave their property.

We would also advise against parking on the footpath, but in some narrow streets we recognise that this is a likely occurrence. As a rule of thumb, it is unlikely that a driver would be prosecuted if they left sufficient space for a wheelchair or pushchair to pass by on the footpath. We are likely to prosecute drivers should the footpath be completely blocked. Drivers should not park in such a way that it forces pedestrians, particularly children, to walk in the road.





#### What is Nearby Share?

Nearby Share is available on Android 6.0 phones. Like Airdrop, it allows users to instantly share files, links and pictures with people around them. It also works through Bluetooth or WiFi. When Nearby Share is turned on, a list of devices available within Nearby Share sharing proximity is visible. When a receiver of content is selected, they will be notified and offered the option to accept or decline the incoming file.

#### What Are the Risks of Airdrop and Nearby Share?

Being exposed to age-inappropriate sexualised and/or violent content.

Photo sharing as a form of cyberbullying, with the person featured in the image being the target.

The sharing of self-generated sexual imagery, with or without the permission of the original image/video creator.

As always, we would encourage honest and open conversations at home about the online world and things that might cause upset to your child.

We know that Tok is a platform popular with young people

but there are concerns about children being vulnerable on this platform, please follow the link to **THIS** page which contains a parents guide to TikTok safety. We have been sent a document from internet matters.org with a parental controls guide which is useful and can be found on THIS page.

## **Setting Up Devices**

Christmas approaching we are aware that some children will be getting new or upgraded devices, older devices may be handed to younger children. I felt that this was a



good time to share information about the importance of setting up devices with parental controls in relation to the age of the child. Internet Matters covers all devices with very simple, easy-tounderstand parental guides which you can find HERE.

Please can we remind parents that NGHS is open to students from 8.00am until **5.00pm.** Students should not be on site beyond 5.00pm unless attending a school club/activity. Please ensure your child is collected by 5.00pm as the winter nights draw in. Thank you for your cooperation.

It provides a safe and secure means of accessing help via the internet from a professional team of counsellors. Whilst your child may not need or use the service, as part of supporting our students, we are ensuring all children, young people and families are aware of provisions in the area that could assist them, now or in the future.

Our qualified counsellors are online 365 days a year. Monday to Friday, from 12noon - 10pm and between 6pm - 10pm on weekends. Kooth has no waiting list or referral process. As well as chatting to our counsellors through a text-based service, young people can message the team 24 hours a day, access our fully-moderated support forums and discussion board, online magazine, self-care activities and other self-help tools.

Pippa was in the junior section scoring 155/200 and came 9th overall out of the largest, very hotly contended section of 38 junior shooters. on the last qualifying card which was the tie breaker.




