
It can be difficult knowing all the different settings that are available on different devices to help protect children, this includes allowing or disallowing chat, friends, spending money, content filters and much more. On these pages you will find the details, as well as non-technical instructions, which will help you understand what is available to you and how to set up your child's devices.

- <u>Smartphones</u>
- Broadband and mobile networks
- Entertainment and search engines

Safety/privacy settings on social media:

With many children and young people using social media it is important to understand what features are available to you to help protect your children. This is also important because for the most part, all privacy settings are default off when a new account is created, but also because some social media providers change their features quite frequently, e.g. TikTok.

Take a look at <u>this link</u> to see what is available to you and how to set up your child's social media. We would also advise doing this with your child so that you can discuss the features together.



WHAT'S HAPPENED IN P S H E (IN HALF TERM 2)

We are delighted to present a round-up of what has been learnt in PSHE lessons this half term.

In the first term of Year 7 PSHE we've been exploring Health and Wellbeing- Transition and safety. This included the topic of basic first aid and CPR. Statistics show that countries where basic life support is taught in schools, survival rates from sudden cardiac arrest are significantly (two to three times) higher than those where they aren't taught. To ensure these sessions were delivered correctly and by a highly trained first aider, we welcomed Mrs Jones, our Operations Manager, into lessons to deliver the training. Students were able to ask questions and physically practice performing effective CPR using the inflatable Annie dolls. Overall, Mrs Jones was very impressed with student engagement across year 7, and



when asked if they felt they could confidently perform CPR to a casualty, over half of the year group said that they would feel confident and that this was as a result of the training they had just received.



During this half term year 8 have been looking at the topic relationships and have been focusing on the topic discrimination and how to recognise and challenge it.

The groups have done this through a range of activities and discussions to help develop their knowledge on this topic.




Year 9

In the first carousel of the year 9 relationships unit students have been focusing on families and parenting, healthy relationships, conflict resolution, and relationship changes. We have discussed these topics through many different activities, such as discussions, scenarios and videos. All students have been actively engaged in all areas of the unit and have shown good understanding.




In Year 11 relationships unit, students learn about 4 main topics: break up's, positive relationships, relationship abuse including domestic abuse and coercive and controlling relationships. We do a number of different activities within these lessons to help all students understand each area, be able to identify red flags and know how to access support. In the year 11 building for the future unit, students learn about self-efficacy, stress management, and future In the first carousel of the year 10 mental health unit students have been focusing on mental health and ill health, stigma, safeguarding health, including during periods of transition or change.


