#### **Uniform Survey Responses**

Thank you to all parents who got in touch with your thoughts around uniform, it was helpful to review this feedback. This has been discussed with the leadership team and at Governors and I wanted to provide an update. These changes will be in place from September 2023.

#### School Uniform

- The logo will be removed from new school jumper purchases; this will reduce the cost of the jumper slightly
- Tall options for trousers are available from the shop on request
- Online ordering is being considered in response to parental encouragement about this matter

#### PE kit

- Personalisation on PE kit will become optional, if this isn't put on the kit then it will reduce to cost of each item slightly. If no personalisation is added then it is important that names are on each item of kit to enable the PE department to return kit to the correct student
- Football socks will now be plain navy blue rather than having the NGHS embroidery
- Tall options for trousers / leggings are available from the shop on request
- Online ordering will continue to be an option

# CHARITY WEEK WAS A HIT!

The week before February half term break was Charities Week. This week saw the whole school community come together to raise money for the three house charities: Austen – The Kinamba Community Project, Roddam – Papyrus Prevention of Young Suicide, and Seacole – Cancer Research UK. The week was extremely successful, and the staff and student's hard work paid off as we were able to raise  $\pounds$ 3,477.89.

Each day had a different dress up theme and lunchtime activity, and it was really nice to see everyone getting involved! On Monday, the hall was packed to the brim with students all dressed up as their favourite subjects selling their homemade goods, running raffles, and guessing how many sweets were in a very large jar. Wednesday was 'Alternative Footwear Day', and the corridors were filled with flippers, slippers, wellies and even roller skates (until they were taken off on health and safety grounds!).

The week's lunchtimes were extremely busy, especially for the staff. On Tuesday, a team of 4 year 13 students went up against Mr Wade (chemistry), Mr Audouin (MFL), Mr Bourne (English) and Mrs Chapman (music) in a tense game of University Challenge. The match got off to a surprising start whereby the English question was correctly answered by Mr Audouin, our native French teacher. To the teachers' surprise, the sixth form team were victorious! Also on Tuesday, a 'Sponge A Teacher' event took place, organised by the Austen House Team, which saw Mr Tolley and Mrs Griffin being pelted with cold wet sponges. After the cancellations in 2021 and 2022 it came as a huge relief that the 2023 ski trip was able to go ahead as planned. Even a 24 hour strike at Munich Airport, resulting in the cancellation of our flight only hours before departure, could not stop us this time. Hastily rearranged travel arrangements meant that the majority of students travelled in the early hours down to Luton with the rest of the party heading to Stansted for flights to Salzburg. 40 students and 6 staff could then join together to head for the mountains and our final destination, The Wiederkehr hotel in Wagrain.

Ski fitting was the usual endurance test with everyone quickly learning that getting a comfortable pair of ski boots is never going to happen. Every effort was made to coordinate the colour of helmets to ski jackets. By the end of our first meal everyone was exhausted and an early night was called for. Everyone was fast asleep within minutes – or maybe not - as my room was two floors away from all the others so heard nothing at all. My female colleagues may have a different story to tell!

NGHS hasn't organised a ski trip for 10 years or so and therefore it was not surprising that the majority of our students were new to skiing. We did have one intermediate group and within minutes of meeting their instructor they were off. The skiing area is a massive 760km of pisted slopes and over the course of the week this group covered most of them. Well done to every one of them.

Watching beginner skiers is a lot of fun. They fall down a lot and move very slowly. However, their learning curve is very steep and it wasn't long before all three groups were off the nursery slopes and tackling blue and red runs. The instructors were most complimentary about the attitude, effort and behaviour of all the girls. I don't think that any of the group can now be classed as a beginner.

The ski trip isn't all about skiing. Breakfast, packed lunches and evening meals are largely spent talking about who had the most spectacular fall of the session. Then there are the evening activities; swimming, ice skating, mini-golf, quiz night, hot chocolate, singing and dancing (no curling as the rink had melted). It was particularly good to see how the different year groups mixed and enjoyed each other's company.

In what seemed like no time at all it was time to start our packing and say goodbye to our home for the week. A big thank you to Georg our Tour Guide who in real life is a professional opera singer. Few will forget his performance at the presentation evening which left us absolutely speechless. More importantly the help he gave to making our trip run smoothly could not have been bettered. Thanks too to the ski instructors who allowed our students to develop their skiing skills so quickly. A vote of thanks also has to go to Monika and her family who provided great care and service at The Wiederkehr. I've stayed there before and I hope it isn't too long before I'm back again.

Finally, a big thank you to the students on the trip and to my colleagues for their fun and companionship. A great team effort by everyone. Look out for details of the 2024 ski trip coming soon.

Prizes will be awarded by the Humanities Faculty (representing History, Geography, Religion and World Views, Politics, Psychology, Economics). There will be prizes for each key stage as well as the obvious benefits of being able to cite success in this competition in support of any future applications for courses in these subjects or those related to them such as Law or Journalism.
