This year, Newport Girls' High School is celebrating International Women's Day with a campaign "inspiring inclusion", focused on promoting women's equality by collectively recognising women's empowerment. The HGT, FemSoc and History Ambassadors have been working hard to promote these ideas, from creating an assembly to share with forms, to adorning the school with themed decorations and inspiring posters like these:



The history of the day is nothing short of inspirational. Clara Zetkin first proposed the idea in 1910, where participants would press for equality within the patriarchal society in which there were many restrictions to women's rights. The idea was taken to the Finnish Parliament, and with unanimous approval, the day was founded and honoured for the first time on 19th March 1911, with one million men and women

supporting it. Since World War One, the day has been marked annually on the 8th March.

It is evident that this day has already brought about so much positive change for women, with its impact continuing to grow year by year.

Inspiring local women...

This is an extract written by Evelyn when she participated in the Historical Association's Great Debate. It highlights the role of one local woman in the 19th century and the impact she made through her foresight and determination:

'Imagine, it's the 1800s, a small market town in the West Midlands: Newport, my home. Schooling was perceived as completely unnecessary for women at this time, leading to not only a staggering lack of permanence for schools but many reflecting not a vocation for teaching, but simply a need to find status and income.

However, one woman challenged these expectations when purchasing and becoming principal of a school in Newport in 1898. Her name was Sarah Jane Mills. Student numbers rose from 28 to 62 by 1901, while it had become a centre for the Oxford Local Examinations, providing innumerable new opportunities.

Even further, she set aside a room for reading, allowing young women to further their own education, along with providing archery facilities at a time when female archers were far from common. Teaching them invaluable and limitless life lessons, she provided the means and belief to ensure the strong grounds for our school today: Newport Girls High School."

Spotlight on... former student, Ailsa M who left the school in 2013 after studying A Levels in History, English Lit and Art & Design. She joined the South Wales Police and we are proud to say is the first female forensic video technician in the force. She was recently featured in an article to highlight International Women's Day and Girls in Science to celebrate the women working in roles related to Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). Here is an extract from the article:

"As a female in STEM in policing, I love my job. My work involves a fascinating technical science which is continuously evolving as new technologies and software is developed. Our industry can at times be quite male-dominated which I think comes from more boys in school taking up ICT and pursuing that as a career rather than girls. I don't actually have a scientific background; I have a degree in History which I feel has really set me up well to be able research thoroughly, defend my findings and be able to write reports articulately. "I would encourage anyone considering a career in forensics to remember that it's not necessarily out of your reach just because you didn't study sciences!"

Well done, Ailsa! We hope this inspires our current students to develop careers in STEM subjects too!
