This was part of an opportunity to trial a new NCS course, promising thrilling activities, invaluable careers advice and the development of personal skills.

In the evening, we set off on a night walk through the picturesque streets of Appledore, the local seaside town where we explored the surroundings and learnt about the areas history.

Friday marked the grand finale of the trip, as teams competed fiercely in the Epic Challenge. This involved navigating an underground tunnel system, climbing challenges, ding bats, and passing an egg through the obstacle course. Meet Mr Jones...

As you will be aware, Mr Adam Jones will be joining us as the new Headteacher of NGHS in September. Mr Jones is currently Deputy Headteacher at Wolverhampton Girls' High School. He has held this position for eight years and has led curriculum, pastoral and safeguarding-focused areas of his current school. Like NGHS, Wolverhampton Girls' is a very successful girls' grammar school which continues to have outstanding Ofsted status following its recent inspection in November. Mr Jones will be writing formally to introduce himself in September and will be visiting the school during the Summer Term to support his preparations for the next academic year. Meanwhile, we posed some questions to Mr Jones to help you get to know him better.



Why did you apply for the post? NGHS is quite rightly regarded as one of the best schools in the West Midlands and the Headteacher vacancy would have been extremely attractive to any aspiring Headteacher. I worked at NGHS for 5 years early in my career as a Maths teacher and have continued to work in the selective sector since. I loved my time at NGHS and it was a difficult decision for me to leave to further enhance mv experience. Throughout the development of my career, I had always hoped that there would be an option for me to return and this opportunity arose at the ideal time. It's obviously been a significant amount of time since I was last at NGHS and the school has developed extensively in that period, but what was clear to me on the interview days and my visits prior was that the supportive community that I had such fond memories of still All the staff and remains. students I spoke to during the interview process were so welcoming and proud of their school. It was at this point that I knew I had made the right decision to apply and now feel incredibly proud and privileged to be able to lead the school on the next stage of its journey.

How do you spend your time outside of school?

Outside of school most of my time is spent with my family. I am married with two boys who are 8 and 6 years old. We try and spend as much time outdoors as we can, going for walks and visiting places. I have an FA coaching qualification and help to coach my eldest son's football team, so we train at the weekend and have matches most Sundays. When we've not got a game, we all go to see my youngest son play rugby for Newport RUFC. I did start running during the pandemic and began to enter a few local races last year and hope to do the same over the summer.

What makes a 'good day' at school?

Any day that demonstrates what the school community is all about. For me that is when students and staff are working together and having fun. Lots of laughter, being considerate, encouraging, and supportive of each other. Sports Day when I was first at NGHS was certainly one of those days that had all these elements and a day I am very much looking forward to in the future, although as a former Roddam form tutor, I do promise to be impartial from now on!

What are you hoping to achieve at NGHS?

My goals are quite simple really; I just want to make sure that the school remains a place where we provide an environment that enables all students to flourish and reach their full potential. I want the staff to enjoy their roles and to understand and recognise the important difference they make for our students.

What makes a 'good day' at school?

I have been at my current school for 14 years. I will obviously really miss my colleagues, many of whom I've worked with throughout that time. If I had to pick one thing though, it would be my tutor group Stafford 9. Students stay in the same tutor group throughout their time at my school and each form has students from Year 7 to 13 in them. This summer, I will be personally handing over the Alevel results envelopes for the Year 13 students who have been in my tutor group since their first day at school when they were 11 years old. It's been a privilege to have been part of their sevenyear journey through the school so I am sad that I will not be able to do the same for the other students in my group.

And finally...can you play the piano like Mr Scott? :)

Ha ha... I was fortunate to be able to come and see the final evening performance of Little Shop of Horrors and I was asked this a few times! It was an amazing production; I do love musicals, particular Les Mis but seeing the show did make me put 'Suddenly, Seymour' on repeat on Spotify for my journey home! The answer is "no" though! My son is having guitar lessons, and we practise together, though I don't envisage I'll be playing accompaniment for the school show anytime soon!

Year 12 History Conference

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Once again the A Level historians were treated to a series of lectures from pre-eminent historians as part of the annual Wars of the Roses Online Conference hosted and organised by the Richard III society. These covered a range of topics such as 'Kingship in late Medieval England' by Professor John Watts of the University of Oxford and Professor Steven Gunn gave a talk on 'Margaret of Burgundy and her support for the Yorkist Pretenders'. A favourite among students was Lauren Johnson's lecture which dealt with the differing interpretations of Margaret of Anjou from the celebrations on her arrival as young bride in 1445 to Shakespeare's portrayal of her as the 'She-wolf of France'. All of the

speakers used contemporary evidence as part of their lectures which the students were also able to read for themselves and it gave a great insight into the work of historians. The conference was finished off with a debate on the 'Constitutional Crisis of 1483' and students voted for whether they thought Richard III had usurped the throne. Having heard an enthusiastic argument on both sides of the debate, the students were very much against the last Plantagenet king despite the best efforts of Matt Lewis who is Chairman of the Richard III Society.

It was a great opportunity for the students to look in depth at some key parts of the course and superb to see some of the ideas already being incorporated into their work.

The Wars of the Roses conference was comprised of mini-lectures from a number of established historians, and it was a very valuable opportunity that aided our learning of this part of history. I found it to be an incredible experience, giving us a chance to experience university-style lectures from some of the historians whose opinions we have been reading through the course. The topics were extremely interesting and engaging; it was also helpful to have an external expert opinion on some of the more controversial topics we have been looking at in class, such as the debate on whether King Richard III was a usurper or not. My personal favourite section was on Margaret of Anjou, the Lancastrian Queen that we did an inquiry on in class, who played an extremely significant role in the conflict. The lecture discussed the use of misogynistic propaganda, and how sexist ideas were exploited by her enemies, which I found fascinating. (Georgia, Y13)

I found the history conference extremely educational and useful in aiding my knowledge on the 'Wars of the roses'. I particularly enjoyed the discussion about Margaret of Anjou and I felt I took away a great level of understanding which I can now apply to my school work. The other discussions were also interesting and helped me gain a deeper knowledge about the topic. Overall, I really enjoyed the opportunity and really appreciate the chance I was given. (Isabelle, Y12) I found the conference highly beneficial for my A-level history studies, as it was a great opportunity to hear university level academics speaking about topics we are learning about. I liked the opportunity to hear the Q+A's at the end of each speaker, as it allowed me to consolidate what I had learned. I especially liked hearing Lauren Johnson speak about Margaret of Anjou, as it was relevant to our class studies, but also expanded my own interest in the topic of medieval women in England. Additionally, as an aspiring university student, the lectures were useful as it provided an insight into what university-style learning is like. Overall, it was a really interesting and educational experience. (Maddie, Y12)

This was a really interesting experience and allowed us to delve beyond the curriculum led by experts in this field to give us a wider understanding of society and politics at the time. The talk about Margaret of Anjou presented by Lauren Johnson was particularly interesting, during which the validity of classing Margaret as a 'She-Wolf' was discussed, based on her actions protecting her son. This allowed us to explore both sides of the argument more fully, as well as gaining extra knowledge about the causes of some of the battles of the Wars of the Roses. Overall, it was a fascinating opportunity that really helped further my understanding of the background behind the course! (Louisa, Y12)
