DUKE OF EDINBURGH SILVER AWARD PRACTICE EXPEDITION

Friday 13th is an ominous date for a school trip. Last Friday Mrs Taylor and myself were determined to ignore superstition as we set off for the Shropshire Hills with 40 intrepid Year 10s for their Duke of Edinburgh silver award practice expedition. We had complete faith that the weather would be kind, and the training sessions and preparation that the students had already undertaken would get them off to a flying start.



I set a challenge at the start of the weekend that everyone should focus on positives to keep the energy high even if feet are aching, tiredness is setting in or the rain is pelting down. I didn't expect everyone to follow this to the letter, but the instructors confirmed that while they were out navigating and traversing the Shropshire Hills, NGHS students remained positive throughout, encouraging each other and rising to the challenge. Saturday morning saw a 7am start, with breakfast cooked by the students on their stoves before a session of intense route planning for groups to finalise their plans for the two-day expedition. Tents were packed into rucksacks along with stoves and provisions, and the group set off



for their 18 km hike. After some navigational challenges, all groups arrived back at base camp and miraculously had the energy to run about and play at the park and playing fields after cooking their meals.

Although energy levels were lower on Sunday morning, Fantastic Four, Blanket Riders, 6 Potatoes, A?, 7Up, The Gymnasts and Cheeky Monks all completed their mission on Sunday afternoon.



Both Mrs Taylor and myself were incredibly proud of the grit and determination shown by everyone on the trip. It is always pleasing when staff from outside the school comment on how polite and kind our students are, and what a brilliant attitude they showed throughout the weekend.



I'm sure lessons will have been learned for the qualifying expedition in September. I would suggest that everyone looks carefully at the food they are planning to bring, as having enough energy is so important, particularly with such a physically challenging expedition.

All students learned a lot about how to pack their rucksacks efficiently and carry them to reduce strain on shoulders and backs, and I'm sure they all learned plenty



about themselves, and should be incredibly proud of how they overcame the challenges that go to make DofE such a brilliant, tough, amazing, tiring and fun way to develop confidence and an array of life skills at NGHS. Well done to everyone involved!

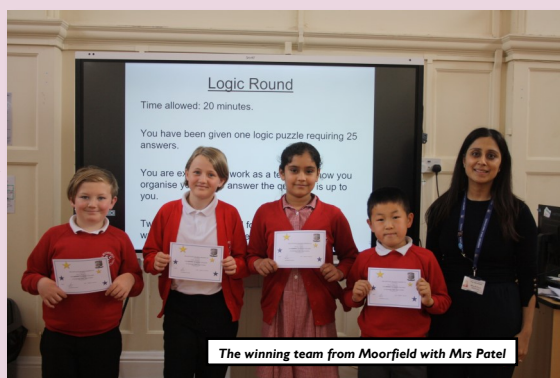


Y5 PRIMARY MATHS CHALLENGE!

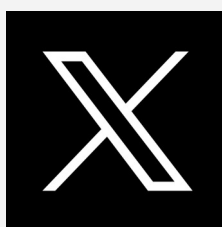

COMMUNICATION WITH SCHOOL

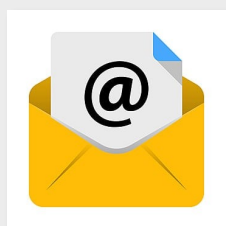
Over the course of the year, we will communicate with you in a variety of ways:

- Every two weeks, we publish **Newport News** on the school website. This document includes news from school, highlights upcoming events, and recent achievements. A link to each edition is sent home by email.
- An annual **Parents' Evening** to update you on your daughter's progress.
- **Grade sheets** and/or **written reports** to update you on your daughter's progress.
- An annual **parent information evening** to outline the key information relevant to each year group. This is in person for Year 7 and remote for other year groups.
- Relevant **letters** to your daughter are sent home via email.
- If teaching or pastoral staff have any concerns relating to your daughter, they will contact you **by phone** or **email**.

Occasions may arise when you need to contact the school to share information or raise concerns. There are several ways in which you can do this, including:

- By telephone – **01952 797550** – If possible, your call will be put through to an appropriate member of staff. Where this is not possible (member of staff is teaching/not in school/unavailable), a message will be taken and passed to an appropriate member of staff. You should expect a response to your call within 24 hours.
- By email – **schooloffice@nghs.org.uk** – You will receive an acknowledgement email once this has been received and be notified that the email has been passed to the appropriate member of staff (this may not always be to whom the email was addressed). You should then expect a response within 24-48 hours of this acknowledgement.
- By **letter** to the school.
- By **recording a note** in the communication section of your daughter's **planner** to be shared with a member of staff.

During school holidays, reception is closed and phone calls/emails cannot be responded to until we return to school. During the school holidays, **urgent@nghs.org.uk** is available to communicate key urgent information; it should not be used to send routine enquiries that can be responded to when school is open again. This account will be checked once every 24 hours by a senior member of staff. They will then make an appropriate response to any email that has been received.

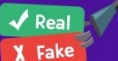

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about GENERATIVE AI SAFETY

Generative AI tools – such as ChatGPT – are now commonly used by children. In fact, 3 in 4 pupils in the 2024 Annual Literacy Survey reported using generative AI, up from just 2 in 5 the previous year. While these tools can boost learning and creativity, they also raise concerns around misinformation, privacy and overuse. This guide explores the key risks and how to support safe use.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

MISINFORMATION AND ACCURACY



Generative AI can sometimes produce false or misleading content. Children – and even adults – may assume the information is accurate and trustworthy. This can affect learning and understanding of important topics. It's vital to teach children to critically assess all information, even when it comes from AI.

EXPOSURE TO INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Because generative AI is trained on vast datasets from across the internet, there is a chance it may occasionally generate harmful or inappropriate content. Without supervision, children could encounter disturbing or unsuitable material. Active monitoring and clear usage boundaries can help reduce this risk.

PRIVACY AND DATA SECURITY

Some AI tools ask for personal details or store users' interactions. If privacy settings are not correctly configured, children's personal data could be exposed or misused. Teaching good digital hygiene and setting strong privacy controls is essential for protecting children online.

REDUCED CRITICAL THINKING



Relying too heavily on AI-generated responses may reduce children's willingness to think independently. If they consistently use AI to solve problems or complete tasks, it could impact their ability to reason, analyse and form their own ideas. Encouraging thoughtful reflection is key.

DIGITAL DEPENDENCY

Regular use of generative AI can contribute to increased screen time and less real-world interaction. If left unmanaged, it may affect physical activity levels, sleep, and social development. Striking a healthy balance between online and offline activities is important for wellbeing.

UNCLEAR ETHICAL BOUNDARIES

Children may not fully understand the ethical implications of using AI to complete homework or creative tasks. This can lead to unintentional plagiarism or dishonest academic practices. Conversations around responsible use and academic honesty are crucial.

Advice for Parents & Educators

ESTABLISH CLEAR GUIDELINES

Set clear, age-appropriate rules for when and how generative AI can be used. Reinforce these regularly to help children develop a healthy, respectful and informed relationship with the technology.

PROMOTE ACTIVE SUPERVISION

Keep an eye on how the children in your care use AI tools. Check in regularly to ensure they're using them appropriately and be ready to step in if something doesn't feel right.

ENCOURAGE CRITICAL EVALUATION

Help children to question the accuracy of AI-generated information and seek out additional trusted sources. This builds essential digital literacy skills and supports better decision-making.

ENHANCE PRIVACY AWARENESS

Talk to children about the importance of keeping personal information private. Make sure privacy settings are in place and explain how data shared with AI tools could be used.
