### An in depth interview with NGHS Director of Sport Mrs R Cowell-Saunders

Years teaching PE – I have taught PE for 15 years.

Why you chose the subject – I have always enjoyed taking part and watching sport. It was my favourite subject in school and I really looked up to my own PE teachers as role models. I find sport very important not just to keep fit and healthy but also very important for mental health and well-being and I wanted to make sure that all students have an understanding of this.

Favourite sport(s) to play/participate in – Growing up I used to run for Wolverhampton and Bilston I did this for 10 years and my main event was the

800m. I then got more into playing football during and after university, where I now play for Tipton Ladies. I absolutely love playing football as I enjoy the team spirit and moral. But I have also got back into my running as I got into the London marathon last year. But I would say my favourite sport to play in is definitely football.

**Favourite sport(s) to watch/spectate and teams/clubs supported** – I love watching many sports, football, athletics and rugby to name a few. If there is any sporting event being shown it will be on our TV at home. But I would say football is my favourite sport to watch. Growing up I had a season ticket with Wolves and I love going to the games with my family. I am a massive wolves fan and love following them. I also love to follow the England team and the Lionesses, especially in the big tournaments. I am hoping the Lionesses can bring it home in the Euros this year.

**Most memorable sporting moment** – This is a hard one. There are a few stand out memorable sporting moments for me. Being at the Millennium Stadium in Cardiff 2003 watching Wolves v Sheffield United for the Championship play off final and seeing wolves get promoted to the premier league, was priceless. Also watching Kelly Holmes in the athletics win gold at the Olympics in 2004 in the 800m and 1500m was unbelievable. Finally, seeing Johnny Wilkinson score the drop kick goal in the 2003 World Cup Final to beat Australia with the last few seconds on the board was brilliant. So many awesome sporting moments. Now I get excited to watch my own daughters take part in sport and see on their faces how much enjoyment it brings to them.

## HOW TO GET IN TOUCH! COMMUNICATION WITH SCHOOL

Over the course of the year, we will communicate with you in a variety of ways:

- Every two weeks, we publish **Newport News** on the school website. This document includes news from school, highlights upcoming events, and recent achievements. A link to each edition is sent home by email.
- An annual **Parents' Evening** to update you on your daughter's progress.
- **Grade sheets** and/or written reports to update you on your daughter's progress.
- An annual **parent information evening** to outline the key information relevant to each year group. This is in person for Year 7 and remote for other year groups.
- Relevant letters to your daughter are sent home via email.
- If teaching or pastoral staff have any concerns relating to your daughter, they will contact you **by phone** or **email.**

Occasions may arise when you need to contact the school to share information or raise concerns. There are several ways in which you can do this, including:

- By telephone **01952 797550** If possible, your call will be put through to an appropriate member of staff. Where this is not possible (member of staff is teaching/not in school/unavailable), a message will be taken and passed to an appropriate member of staff. You should expect a response to your call within 24 hours.
- By email **schooloffice@nghs.org.uk** You will receive an acknowledgement email once this has been received and be notified that the email has been passed to the appropriate member of staff (this may not always be to whom the email was addressed). You should then expect a response within 24-48 hours of this acknowledgement.
- By letter to the school.
- By **recording a note** in the communication section of your daughter's **planner** to be shared with a member of staff.

During school holidays, reception is closed and phone calls/emails cannot be responded to until we return to school. During the school holidays, **urgent@nghs.org.uk** is available to communicate key urgent information; it should not be used to send routine enquiries that can be responded to when school is open again. This account will be checked once every 24 hours by a senior member of staff. They will then make an appropriate response to any email that has been received.

## **Spotting Quiet Strengths**

Daily ways to wellbeing

#### Did you know?

As the school year ends, the loudest successes can often take centre stage—test scores, certificates, standout performances. But for many pupils, this term has been a story of quiet strength: showing up each day, managing worries, supporting others, or simply keeping going when things felt hard. Spotting and celebrating these quieter qualities can boost confidence, connection, and a deeper sense of belonging. They're also often the strengths that last the longest.

## Praise small steady efforts

Not every pupil is a high-flyer or high-fiver! Some just keep going—managing friendships, turning up, trying again, or showing kindness when no one's watching. These deserve as much recognition as the big wins. Writing a short note for a pupil who's made quiet progress—"I've noticed you've been trying really hard to..." or "You've shown a lot of patience with..." The micro-moments matter a lot!

## 2 Invite pupils to spot strengths in each other

Sometimes peers see things we miss. Giving pupils a chance to reflect on each other's strengths can boost connection and help quieter children feel seen. Using a "strengths circle" or small cards where pupils write anonymous strengths they've seen in classmates. (e.g., "You helped me when I was stuck" or "You always make time for others.")

## 3 widen the definition of achievement

End-of-term reports often focus on academic progress. Consider what else pupils have grown in this year—confidence, friendships, self-awareness, or simply being more curious or compassionate. Including a personal strength in verbal or written feedback shifts the focus from what they've done to who they're becoming. E.g. "This term, one of your strengths has been..." or "you're becoming a (insert character strength here) person".
